Thuringia Wins Fight For Valuable Violin

WEIMAR, (AP)—A famous Stradivarius violin, made for years in a safe deposit vault, recently passed definitely into the hands of the Thuringian government, which had been besieged the instrument but was later used for its recovery by heirs of the donor. The litigation continued many years.

Patulous offers made for the Stradivarius led the heirs to start out on the strength of a check in the will of the donor. Concerning the purchase of the violin, the heirs requested one condition: namely a lower cost and appeal to the supreme court, which refused their claim.

Here Koempel, who was the favorite pupil of Ludwig Spohr, had first given his beloved instrument to the Thuringian Academy for the blind, a government institution, but now it has been returned to the care of Professor Botta, present conservator of the German National Theater of Weimar.

Middle West Will Harvest Bumper Crops This Season

CHICAGO, (By the Associated Press)—Two weeks' better yield bumper crops is the predominant note of reports from agriculture throughout the middle west. Several sections reported bumper crops, many reported better crops, and all heard from reported better prices for farm products, but the high note was the report of better financial conditions, which came from communities where early frost and later drought severely damaged crops. In those sections, the farmers faced their ancient field enemies hooped up by the prospect that better prices and better business conditions would more or less offset the damage of nature.

Statistics compiled by the National Bank of Commerce of St. Louis state that in the three years ago a given quantity of farm products, when exchanged for industrial goods was worth only 88 per cent of its 1912 exchange value, now it is worth 125 per cent. William Martin, chairman of the board of the Federal Reserve bank of St. Louis, said this increased purchasing power in the country was due to larger crops and higher prices.

Apprenticed and re-converted South Dakota reported late in South Dakota the 1925 crop, several agricultural statisticians. Conditions were at least average good in North Dakota, agricultural conditions reported at Missouri. The agricultural and livestock outlook were optimistic.
