London's "Wall Street" Shrinks.
About 97 per Cent Each Night

LONDON (AP)—The way of London's City of London is 22 times greater than the night population, statistics in the official census of work-places show.

At night there are 12,708 people in the city and during the day 425,715. These latter have to be transported to and from the suburbs morning and night in something less than two hours.

The suburbs of Hammersay and Leyton provide the greatest number of London's day population, followed closely by East Ham, Hauxwell and Walthamstow.

The "city" in London is a section in which many of the large financial and banking houses are located and in a measure corresponds to what in New York is called the Wall Street district.

FOREIGNERS USE TRACTOR

That the farmers of Europe and South America are developing crop producing land through use of motorized equipment to a higher degree at this time than ever before in history is indicated in Fordan tractor foreign sales reports just made public by the Ford Motor company. Shipments of tractors during the seven months of 1925 ending July 31, were more than 74 per cent greater than during the corresponding period of 1924.

Foreign deliveries of tractors reached the new high record of 15,119 during the first seven months of 1925 and in view of the rapidly mounting demand for power farming machinery in the old world the outlook is bright for even greater increase in foreign sales. It was stated:

A feature in connection with the European shipments is the fact that in many instances, the farmers have advanced three or four generations in progress in turning to the tractor for motive power. In many of the picturesque farms in France, Belgium, Russia and the Soviet union, the Fordson is taking over work which was heretofore done by oxen. In other instances, the new tractor is merely being added to a fleet on some of the larger farms.

Foreign deliveries of Ford cars and trucks as well as Lincoln cars set a new record during the first seven months of 1925. Sales of Ford cars and trucks totaled 124,342 or 22,988 more than were delivered in foreign countries during the corresponding period of 1924, net including foreign and domestic sales of the Ford Motor company of Canada, Ltd., which totaled 52,489 during the same months this year.

Although the increase in absorption of cars and trucks is proportionate over Europe and South America, the remarkable increase in Fordson tractor deliveries is due primarily to Europe's awakening to the need of maximum production from limited areas under cultivation. In South America the tractor has long held a place as standard equipment and increased sales there, although less spectacular than in Europe are increasing to cover the normal expansion of agriculture.

To give the motorized police of New York City an intimate knowledge of the construction and operation of the Ford cars recently purchased by the city, a special Ford school has been established by the New York Police academy at 24th street and Lexington avenue. More than 2,000 police sergeants and patrolmen detailed to the motor division of the police force are enrolled in the Ford school in a course which completion covers every phase of the Ford engine, electrical, clutch and drive system.

American Students Get Honor Marks in Final Oxford Tests

(Chicago, Ill., Eng. (AP))—The honor list issued as a result of the final Oxford examinations this year shows that the Americans in the university maintained a standard of scholarship far above that of the average English student, and only a little below that of the holders of the college scholarships. For a number of years Americans have been at the head of the first classes awarded, and this year they also have taken a high proportion of first places in the medical examinations.

The special aptitude of Americans for the study of English law is difficult to understand because it is a legal system differing widely from that in America, and is based on English social and political institutions which have no American counterpart. It is a tribute to the ability of the Rhodes scholars that a number of them who know no Latin on their arrival at Oxford have mastered the Roman law and obtained first classes. The Oxford examinations disclose that intellectual ability is confined to no one district or no university in America. The highest honors go as often to the west and south as to New England and to men

Swedish Children Train On Military Drill Ground

MALMOE, Sweden (AP)—The old military drill ground at Ljungbyhed has been converted into a playground this summer, where school children, accompanied by their teachers, have been camped in the army barracks, while receiving instruction in physical culture and outdoor life. It has been the largest mobilization of school children ever seen in Sweden and has been so successful that it will be repeated next year.
