Whitefish is delicious split and broiled under the gas flame. As this is an only fish so extra oiling is necessary. Any fish can be broiled and it is a particularly satisfactory way in cooking fish during the summer months. Children as young as three years of age may be allowed to eat broiled fish.

Vegetable Chowder.
Three coarse blades celery, 2 medium-sized onions, 2 medium-sized carrots, 2 potatoes, 4 cups boiling water, 2 teaspoons salt, 4 teaspoon pepper, 2 thin slices bacon, 1/2 cup rice, 2 cups milk.

Cut bacon in thin pieces and cook in soup kettle until crisp. Add onion cut in thin slices and cook over a low fire for 5 minutes. Add remaining vegetables pared and cut in small dice, rice, salt, pepper and boiling water. Cover and simmer until vegetables are tender, about 1 1/2 hours. Add milk, bring to the boiling point but do not let boil. Serve very hot.

JEWISH CHRISTIAN TALKS

OREGON CITY, Ore. (Special).
—A Hebrew Christian, Pastor E. C. Gilbert of Washington, D. C., spoke at the Gladstone park to 2000 people attending the Western Oregon conference. In his early life Gilbert prepared for the ministry of the Jewish priesthood. Forty years ago he accepted the Christian religion, during these years he has lectured and traveled extensively in this country, Canada, Europe and the far east.

"Christ," he stated, "is now carrying on his work of interest for man in the heavenly tabernacle, which is the anti-type of the one Moses built according to God's direction."

Thursday night Mr. Gilbert will speak on "Why We Have so Many Earthquakes," and tell of his experiences in the Japanese earthquake in 1923.
