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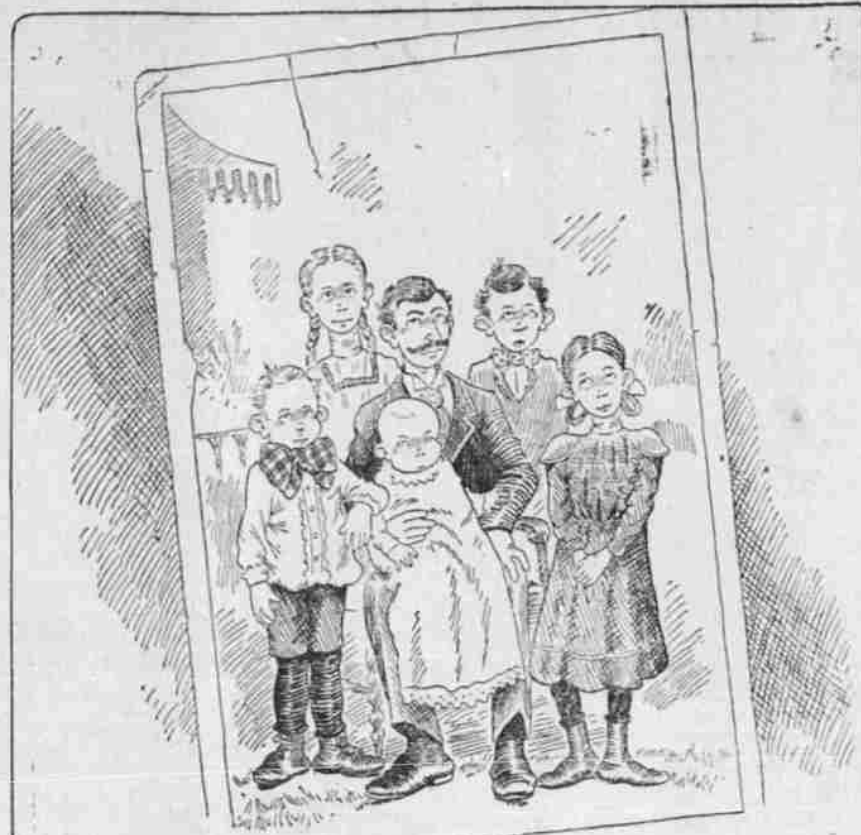

**Farm Pointers**

Now is the time to make hill selections of potatoes for next year's seed. Get a bunch of both or other small stalks. Go through the fields and select vigorous healthy plants that are not near to diseased ones. Avoid potatoes showing yellowing leaves or leaves that are discolored or spotted in any way. Stake dark green plants with three to five or more vigorous stalks, not spindly, knobby or leafy stems or excess root. Leaves should be rather smooth, even dark green and free from mottling.

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**Many Countries Will Exhibit At Prague International Fair**

PRAGUE, (AP)—The eleventh International Fair at Prague will be held from September 5 to 15. The participating countries will be the largest, but among the other outstanding features will be the radio and sports goods exhibits. The latter is indicative of the growing importance of sports of all kind as part of the national life.

The participation of foreign countries will be greater than at previous fairs. Besides a special French section there will be exhibits from the United States, Austria, Germany, Italy, Greece, Great Britain, Netherlands, Sweden, Denmark, Belgium, Switzerland, Hungary and Yugoslavia.
