SHIP'S OFFICER JAILED ASTORIA, Ore. (Special). - Following the finding of 61 bottles of assorted liquors, including cognac, Madeira, sherry and champagne, concealed in the quarters of officers of the steamship Tishnara, of the Trans-Atlantic line, which arrived here aboard from Australia, Carl Johanson, third engineer of the vessel, was arrested on complaint of H. B. Lamb, deputy collector of customs, and charged with bringing liquor into the country illegally.

Johanson appeared before United States Commissioner Howard K. Zimmerman this afternoon and waived a preliminary hearing. He was released on \$150 bail to appear before a United States court in Portland.

The customs officers, who were assisted in the raid by Federal Prohibition Agent J. C. McKnight and Deputy Sheriff H. G. Wicks, declared that liquor was found in the quarters of six of the ship's officers, including those of Captain Bergendahl.

No further arrests were made, but in his report to the Portland office, Deputy Collector Lamb recommended the filing of charges against others of the ship's personnel in whose quarters liquor was found and a charge against the vessel.
