Sister Mary Says:

Breakfast—Steamed prunes, cereal, thin cream, crisp wheat toast, milk, coffee.

Luncheon—Creamed carrots, tomatoe cheese sandwiches, celery, apple sauce, glassbread, milk, tea.

Dinner—Lamb loaf, creamed potatoes, buttered peas, salad of tomatoes stuffed with pineapple and cream cheese, blackberry cream, plain cake, whole wheat bread, milk, coffee.

If every family will use plenty of tomatoes and apples during the season for the fresh fruit they will be that much healthier. Babies less than a year old are given strained tomato, juice and apple sauce as protective and corrective foods. Apples and tomatoes are usually cheap and they surely are quite as delicious as the most expensive delicacy.

Blackberry Cream

Two cups blackberry pulp and juice, 1 cup sugar, 2 cups milk, 1 cup whipping cream, 2 eggs (yolks), 2 tablespoons gelatin, 1/2 cup cold water.


Beat yolks of eggs with 2 tablespoons of sugar. Scald milk; add slowly to first mixture. Add 1/2 teaspoon of salt and cook in double boiler until mixture coats spoon. Stir rapidly in cold water and dissolve over hot water. Stir into custard. Let stand until cool and add berry juice and sugar. When mixture begins to stiffen fold in cream whipped until firm. Turn into a mold and let stand on ice for several hours to chill and become firm.

Radio Chats

Many people believe the more tubes a radio has the better it is. This is not so.

It is the way the tubes are used that counts.

Numerous manufacturers have to make five and six-tube sets because they do not own any patents or licenses that would permit them to get better results by using three tubes.

"Please stand by" is a phrase not used at station WJW in Cincinnati. A special microphone is used to tell the artist when to "prepare" and when to "broadcast" and through the use of the solo and continuous program without interruption, and making it unnecessary to ask the radio audience to "please stand by" while the studio is being arranged for the next number, as is the case when only one studio is available in a broadcasting station.

At this time of the year when broadcasting conditions are not as good as during the winter, it is a good plan to try all wire connections to see that the ground wire and antennae are properly connected, that the battery connections are clean and tight, that the batteries are in good order—in brief, that your whole radio house is in good order.

With all connections O. K. and with batteries and tubes in good working order and assuming, of course, that the set itself is in good working condition, reception should be good. If you use wet batteries, keep them well charged.

Musical Study for Episcopal Clergymen Urged as Necessary

NEW YORK (AP)—Episcopal church clergymen are not particularly musical, intimates the report which a joint commission on church music has just completed for consideration at the general convention of the church which will meet in New Orleans October 7 next.

The report asks in effect how can a minister exercise the sole authority for administration of church music in his parish, which church law gives him when he does not know anything about music? Renewal is made of the recommendation of three years ago that courses in history and practice—and appreciation—of church music be established in all the theological seminaries. Some progress along these lines has been made, the report adds, but there is still great room for improvement.

SANITARY DUMP BURNS

ROSEBURG, Ore.—A stubborn fire at the city dump has been giving the city officials and fire department much trouble. Because of the offensive smell, residents demanded that the fire be extinguished, but doing so is another matter.

Mayor Houck, a sanitary inspector of army camps during the war, adopted the army style of refuse disposal and had had rubbish dumped over the grade onto a marshy shelf of land, and as the pile built up level it was covered with dirt.

Fire started in one end of this three days ago and has eaten underneath. Water failed to smother it and dynamite was resorted to. This, however, also proved a failure, and firemen started sluicing away the entire pile of rubbish in order to reach the blaze.
