**RIDER PLANS LONG TRIP**—PENDELTON, Ore.—Hert J. McCloud, chairman of the world's record for long distance horseback riding, will leave Pendleton Round-up park September 19, on a 26,000-mile horseback ride during which he proposes to visit every state in the union and to cross every desert in the country.

The purpose of the trip is to demonstrate that the American-bred horse is the equal of Arabian horses in hardiness, McCloud stated. His horse is Red Eagle, a five-year old gelding weighing 1,100 pounds, which was broken 25 days ago and has been ridden 1,000 miles. He will have to average 21 1/2 miles daily. McCloud has been a cowboy much of his life and claims to have been the last of the penny express riders of his native state of Arizona.

"After all, it is Sargent's interpretation of a great work, and it has a tremendous artistic interest on that account. It is not merely slavish imitation. I have not seen this particular work myself, but he has surely breathed something of his own spirit into it."

"He was not, however, like Manet, another great copyist. Manet used original works in the same way that a great pianist uses a theme on which to improvise. Sargent did not improvise. He merely interpreted. And I should like to see the same work copied by other artists, just as I would like to hear a dozen pianists play the same Beethoven sonata."

"As far as I know, this is the first sale at which a copy has fetched a high price. It will not be the last."
