**California Town Picks Up And Moves to New Location**

**BARSTOW, Cal. (AP)**—This little town of approximately 2000 persons, being on the outskirts of the Mojave desert, an important link in transcontinental railroad traffic, is on the move. The business section is being shifted to a new site a quarter of a mile away. Two conditions were largely responsible for the transplanting. One was that the National Old Trails highway runs through Barstow, three blocks from the business center. The other was that the old townsite lies between opposing tracks and freight yards owned jointly by the Santa Fe and Union Pacific. Both were in the market for the land, for its acquisition would enable freight and passenger yards to be united.

**Has Conclusive Evidence of Life On Mars, Says Cambridge Man**

**CAMBRIDGE, Eng. (AP)**—G. H. Hamilton of Trinity college, soon will present to the International Astronomical Union of the evidence on Mars of sentient beings with a civilization of 36,000 years to their credit. "My proofs are fortifying," said Dr. Hamilton recently. "That Mars is in the condition the earth is approaching—that is, a desert. Once it had seas, but they have disappeared. The mountains and hills are gone, worn away by wind erosion. The canals are not ditches nor water courses, as commonly supposed, but vegetation on each side of canals of water. These canals are routes of travel for commerce and anything else."

### Baby Peggy's Face Now Insured For \$250,000.

Baby Peggy, the famous screen starlet, who will be seen at the Sherry theatre in "Captain January," had her face insured for the cool sum of \$250,000. The policy was contracted for with Lloyd's Insurance Company, Limited, of London.

This is, as far as records can show, the only policy of its kind ever issued and one of the biggest financially in the records of Lloyd's offices.

The policy covers the face of Baby Peggy only and includes blindness, scarred features, or in fact any facial disfigurement that would prevent the little actress appearing before the camera in a starring capacity. The length of the policy is for one year, beginning the 28th of this month.

The policy was applied for shortly after Baby Peggy signed her new contract with Sol Lesser of Principal Pictures corporation.

The length of her contract with that organization is for three years and it is agreed that each year the "facial insurance" will be carried.

One of the features of the unique policy is the rate upon which it is based—one of the lowest rates ever granted. This is due, according to officials of the insurance company, to the extreme care taken of the child at all times. She is always surrounded by either a nurse, governess, or father or mother. She is never permitted to enter an automobile without one of her parents being with her. Her work at the studio does not cause her the slightest danger of accident. In fact, it would be hard to find another child or five years of age, who is so carefully guarded against harm as little Baby Peggy Montgomery.

### Labor Disputes Cause Loss

OF MILLIONS OF DOLLARS IN ENGLAND (LONDON (AP))—Over 8,000,000 working days were lost during 1924 in England owing to labor disputes, which numbered 709 and involved 612,000 work people, says the Ministry of Labor Gazette. The annual loss of working time owing to industrial disputes during 32 years averaged 12,400,000 days, equivalent to less than one day per head of the whole employed population. During 1919-22 the figures were much above the average, but in 1923 and 1924 as well as the first six months of 1925 they have fallen to considerably less than an annual average of one day per head of the employed population.
