Sister Mary Says:

(By Sister Mary)
Breakfast—Oranges, jelly, crisp broiled bacon, baked eggs, creamed potatoes, diet and rice muffins, milk, coffee.

Luncheon—Baked cabbage, eye bread and butter sandwiches, apple custard, oatmeal cookies, milk, tea.

Dinner—Country-fried chicken, mashed potatoes, gravy, corn on the cob, jellied vegetable, mince, chocolate and macaroni cream, whole wheat bread, milk, coffee.

When young chickens weigh from 2 to 3 pounds dressed they are most delicious. Disjoint and fry in hot butter and lard. The meat close to the bone under the crisp fried covering should be given to children under six years of age. This meat is really cooked by steam since after the chicken is browned the spider is covered and the heat reduced. Sixty full minutes should be given to the cooking of the birds.

Apple Custard
Six or eight apples, 1/2 cup sugar, 4 eggs, 2 cups milk & teaspoon salt. Pare, core and slice apples. Add 1/2 cup boiling water and cook until broken and soft. Add sugar and beat with a fork until smooth. If not smooth, rub through a sieve. There should be from 1 1/2 to 2 cups. Scald milk. Beat yolks of eggs with
