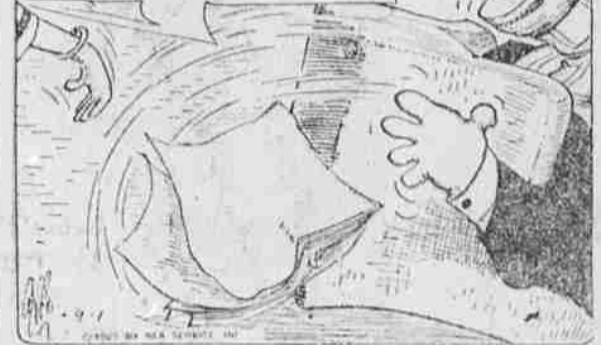

TULSA MEGGA FOR VETERANS

TULSA, Okla., (AP)—Tulsa is ready to entertain upwards of 2,000 members of the Veterans of Foreign Wars at their national convention here August 30 to September 4, as well as a large number of women who will be here for the simultaneous meeting of the ladies' auxiliary.

An aviation meet will feature the "On-to-Tulsa" race, in which various prizes will be awarded fliers arriving from distant points throughout the six days of the gathering. Both army and commercial airplanes will be entered in several contests. Among them will be a race in which the Missouri national guard, the Colorado guard and a unit of the reserve officers' flying corps from Kansas City will participate.

Business sessions, held daily, will be interspersed with a varied entertainment program. Included will be a wrestling match between champion Ed "Strangler" Lewis and Howard Cantowine of Iowa; polo games; a trip to an Indian reservation in a Tulsa suburb, where 200 Indians have promised to pitch a typical Indian village, and several excursions into the Oklahoma oil fields. A number of teas and receptions have been arranged for the ladies' auxiliary.

Empress of Japan Takes Care of Own Silk-Worms

TOKYO, (AP)—The Empress is as much devoted to sericulture as are the numerous women of Japan's rural districts. There is a special economy constructed in the palace compound and, since the beginning of this spring, the empress has personally looked after with taking care of the silk-worms and feeding them on mulberry leaves.

The transfer of the matured silkworms to the cocoon beds of the royal economy will be made shortly and it is estimated that the cocoon yield this year will be not less than 50 tons. By order of her majesty the cocoons will be taken to the Tokyo Silk Reeling school to be converted into silk thread. When this is done the silkskins will be sent to the Tigher Technological school at Kyoto to be carefully woven into Habutae.

It is said that the empress now wears a kimono woven from this Habutae cloth which came from her majesty's economy.
