**MANAGER'S TASK.**  
 Managing a ball club largely revolves around the proper handling of the material at hand.  
 Last year the Chicago White Sox finished in last place. It was the first time in the history of the American league that such a thing had happened.  
 Three times prior to 1924 the club had dropped to seventh place but somehow it always managed to avoid the cellar.  
 Detroit, by the way, is now the only club in the American league that has never finished last.  
 Last year the Chicago club was without a regular pitcher much of the season. These days Frank Chance from starting the race. Cohen joining Myers served, until Cohen joined him out for over a month. Eddie Collins suited in the position until Myers got back on the job.  
 As a result of the makeshifts in managing, the club had a stormy voyage throughout the season. For various reasons a number of players failed to perform up to their standard of play.  
 A manager must cater to the whims of his athletes if he is to get the best results. He cannot handle them all alike and hope to get anywhere.  
**CASE OF MOSTIL.**  
 Last year Outfielder Johnny Mostil was just a capable player. This season he is one of the most valuable outfielders in the American league.  
 Mostil, because of the right sort of encouragement, is making all possible use of his great speed. He is taking chances, getting away with some, falling in others, but as a whole he is making for confidence in himself.  
 One of the fastest men in the American league, Mostil stole only seven bases in 1924. Already this year he has pilfered more to 40 and is almost certain to do so or better this year.  
 He never bases-running has made possible many a Chicago victory this year that might have gone the other way. In the field he has performed brilliantly. Despite a bad start at the bat he should hit .290.  
**MOSTIL'S SENSATIONAL WORK.**  
 Mostil's sensational work for the Chicago White Sox is proof of the fact that a manager, in his handling of a player, can make or break him.  
**THIRLING STAIL.**  
 Then there is Pitcher Ted Blankenship. At the present writing he has won seven in a row for the White Sox. That is as many as he won all last season.  
 At one stage of the race last year Blankenship, in disgust, quit the game and went home. Today, if placed on the market, he would bring a fancy price.  
 Until this year Blankenship depended almost entirely on speed to get him by. That is impossible with the lively ball.  
 This spring it was made apparent to the Sox that he must develop a change of pace. He went one better, not only acquiring a change of pace but also adding a most deceptive knuckle ball to his repertoire.  
 Proper encouragement and advice have made a most capable performer out of a pitcher who last season was just average.

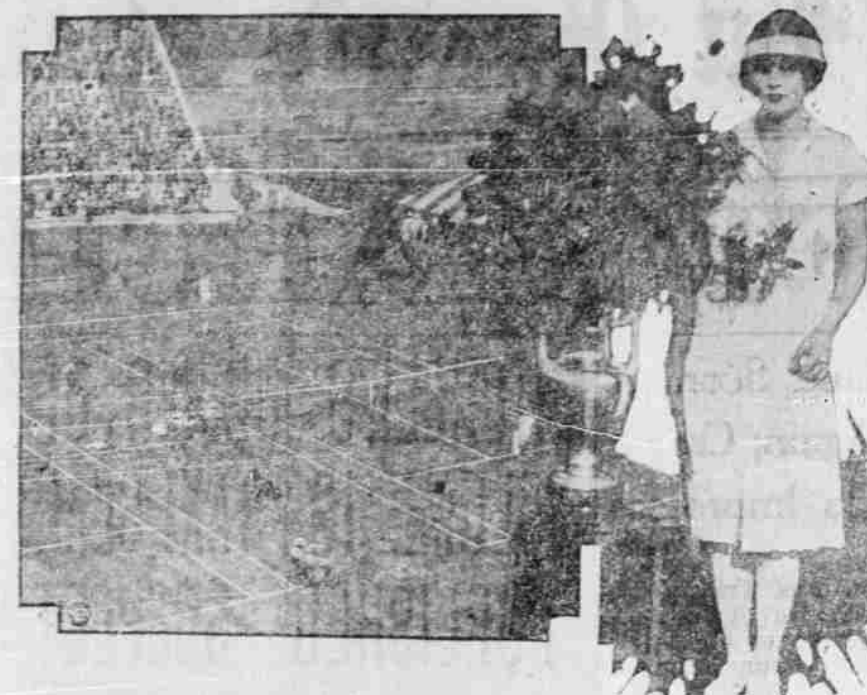

Taxes Lowered in Hungary.

**BERLIN (AP)**—As a result of the favorable state of the country's finances, the tax on commercial sales in Hungary has been reduced from three per cent to two per cent. The income tax, which is also to be materially reduced, has been completely abolished for two years. The industries and handicrafting reports from Budapest that this year's Hungarian budget shows a surplus of \$7,000,000 gold crowns.

**Crusade to Again Put Religion in Homes**

**INDIANAPOLIS, Ind. (AP)**—Restoration of religion to its place as a factor in American home life will be the aim of the first Christian family crusade, to be held here October 1 to 7.  
 The crusade is sponsored by the Christian family crusade, under the direction of Rev. William Gerstlitz, head of the Chicago, Gov. Ed Jackson and U. S. Senators Samuel M. Ralston and James Watson of Indiana head a state committee which is arranging for local participation of delegates from all sections of the country.  
 After the keynote of the crusade will be sounded on the opening day with guests from men of national repute for restoration of worship and religious training in the American home, the meeting will be divided into three periods of three days each, devoted to consideration of the relation of the American family to the home, the church and the nation.  
 Division of the United States into 20 areas is contemplated by the crusade for restoration of the movement to be launched at the convention, with specific assignments to be conducted in each of the areas to further the substitution of the nation in the family crusade.

**TOKYO (AP)**—A commission which recently returned from the Loochoo Islands, which lie between Japan and Formosa, reported that the inhabitants have been reduced to abject misery because of the scarcity of food this year. Many of them, it was stated, are eating the bark of banana plants ground into powder. It is now proposed that the unfortunate residents be permitted to use the sugar and make cakes, amounting to about 2,000,000 yen, for the purchase of food.

**Receipts to Be Taken Up by Game Commission**

The following letter has been sent to all deputy game warden in the state of Oregon from E. F. Averill, state game warden:  
 "It having come to the state game department that certain license holders have at times, when out of license, issued receipts in lieu thereof on which persons have proceeded to fish and hunt, you are requested to take up such receipts wherever found and mail same to the commission together with a report of the circumstances under which the receipt was taken up. Notify all holders of such receipts to apply to the person who issued the receipt and get their money back or obtain a license.  
 "Under Section 42, Chapter 210, General Laws of Oregon, 1925, unless a person has a license and is carrying same on his or her person, at time of fishing or hunting, the above section is being violated and the person violating same must be arrested and taken to court."
