## Radio Chats

### DUST OFF YOUR RADIO.

If you are a real radio fan your receiving set has gone through hundreds of hours of operation during the past nine months and has received little attention. The B batteries have no doubt delivered a great deal of current since they were looked after. The antenna has been subjected to wear and tear of the elements as well as being covered with coal smoke, etc. The solder connections on the receiver set have plenty of jars and rattles to shake them loose. And so it goes.

There are really four primary causes for a set not functioning properly — tubes that have been abused electrically (by this we mean burned too bright) or mechanically, batteries down, faulty condition of the set, and weather conditions. Very often the fault

is in the tubes. Take them to some reliable radio dealer and have them tested. They should test at least one milliamper on a regular tube checker and if they do not test this high you need new tubes. The next thing to do after is dust—dust is very easy to get out of a set but causes much trouble while there. The place where it does the most harm is on the condenser plates. Dust can be removed from condenser plates by means of an ordinary pipe cleaner. Bend the cleaner into an oval using the two ends as a handle and run the rounding part through the plates which will remove the accumulation very nicely. A new cleaner should be used on each condenser, however.

Other parts of the set will accumulate dust which will in turn absorb more or less moisture and thereby cause the set to be noisy. These are the panel places between binding posts, the baseboard or the sub-panel and in some cases the resistance wire on the rheostat is corroded badly. Dust is removed from the baseboard or sub-panel by means of a dry cotton cloth; corrosion is removed from the resistance wire by scraping with a knife blade or a fine emery cloth.

The last thing to round into shape in the battery system. The solution in a storage battery should test between 1250 and 1300 when the battery is fully charged, 1200 at half charge and 1150 it is discharged and should be recharged before further use.

ing off of signal strength and noise in the broadcast receiver is caused by something being loose in the set itself.

It must be borne in mind that summer radio was ushered in after the radio set had gone through a long winter season of nightly operation for hours at a time and is very much in need of replacements and a general overhauling. Therefore, just as a motorist would go over his car before starting out on a long summer season, so should the radio fan go over his set to see if the tubes, batteries, condensers, aerial and ground are in the best possible condition for the winter period when his tip-top operating will bring joy and thrills.

Radio housecleaning starts with the antenna and ground, or the wave reception part of the radio set. The first thing that should be done is to overhaul the ground connection. This is done first by removing the ground connection, whether it is an old valve pipe or otherwise, scrape the wire ground clamp and pipe or rod driven into the ground, whichever it may be, and securely replace the clamp. Or, course if the connection is soldered well this will not be necessary.

The second step is caring for the antenna. This is accomplished by taking down the aerial and looking it over thoroughly. See if the insulators have any cracks in them — a crack in an insulator will cause a great deal of trouble, especially in damp weather, as it will cause the leak which will partially ground the system. If the wires used are bare scrape it with a knife to remove the coating of oxide and dirt that has formed during the time of its installation. Look over the joints to see that they are well soldered. When putting the aerial back up be sure that it does not touch any trees and see that the lead-in is well insulated from any part of the house.

## Sister Mary Says:

(By Sister Mary)

**Breakfast**—Apple sauce, cereal, thin cream, crisp whole wheat toast, soft cooked eggs, milk, coffee.

**Lunch**—Peppers stuffed with rice and cheese, graham bread, peach souffle, milk, tea.

**Dinner**—Salisbury steak, creamed potatoes, buttered lima beans, apple-curry nut salad, sponge cake, watermelon, milk, coffee, oatmeal bread.

This is a "quick and easy" dinner for a hot night when a hot meal is needed. The meat is broiled in 20 minutes, the potatoes might well be cold and reheated in their sauce, and the lima will cook in 30 minutes at the most. The rest of the dinner needs no heat at mealtime and except for mixing the salad little preparation.

**Peach Souffle**

One-fourth cup butter, 3 cup bread crumbs from soft part of loaf, 1 cup milk, 4 tablespoons sugar, 2 eggs, 1 cup finely diced peaches.

Melt butter, add crumbs and milk and cook, stirring constantly until thick and smooth. Remove from fire and whisk of egg one at a time beating each yolk well into mixture. Fold in the whites of the eggs beaten until stiff and dry on a platter using a whisk. Put peaches into a well-buttered baking dish, sprinkle with 2 tablespoons sugar and pour over first mixture. Bake in a pan of hot water in a moderate oven for 40 minutes. Serve at once or the souffle will fall.

## Pan-European Competition Urged Against U. S. Films

BERLIN, (AP)—Pointing out that it is useless for Europeans to compete with the United States in the motion picture film business, Dr. Roland Schacht, one of the leading German producers, advocates a joint European production of American film production. "Everyone for himself, but all for Europe," is the motto he recommends.

Dr. Schacht says American film producers persistently outbid European rivals and buy or erect agencies or theaters and have managed to acquire a controlling influence in many of the largest foreign companies. It is high time, he urges, for European producers of all countries to join forces in the matter of their productivity, rather than the marketing of their products.
