AIR CRUISER UNABLE TO BEST WINDS

LIEUTENANT E. W. SHEPHERD, Washington, D. C., engineer officer.

The seriously wounded list included: John F. McCarthy, Freehold, N. J., and Gunner Cole.

Most of the dead were found in the tangled wreckage of the engine cabin where a full crew was on duty, attempting to ride out the hurrying winds which resulted in complete destruction of the craft.

Amputations and other convalescents were soon carrying the dead and injured to nearby towns.

Each portion of the ship was completely wrecked by the impact with the ground. A guard was thrown about around the debris.

Stays of Wreck Told

Colonel C. G. Hall, army observer on the Shenandoah, told a vivid story of the disaster.

"We were drawing away from the storm, traveling 50 miles an hour when the storm enveloped us and broke the ship into three pieces," he said. "When the crash came I was on a ladder leading from the control cabin to the rear portion of the ship. As I started to fall, I clutched a girder, swung my body over it and crawled to rest back into the ship."

When he reached the ship proper he found other members of the crew preparing to open valves in order to descend. They made a safe descent after traveling 12 miles.

Watched Struggle

In the weird half light of the early morning storm, the angry clouds were rent intermittently by forks of lightning and the families of S. O. Davis and Frank Nelson, farmers, watched the death struggle between the elements and the Shenandoah. They saw the Shenandoah would stand motionless fifteen minutes and then dart upwards under terrific air pressure.

White faced and powerless they watched the struggle in the heavens in its tragic climax. They saw the Shenandoah slowly settled and then, with her nose pointing perpendicularly toward the sky, she was torn asunder. The nose drifted away into darkness and the remaining carrying all who were killed, except Lane, Shipperd, crashed to the earth. Shipperd met his death while clinging to the ship's nose by a rope.
