SURVIVORS REVIEW AIR DISASTER

wrecked in a storm yesterday, is being broken up by wind, much as an ocean-going ship is broken up by the waves.

Fourteen dead members of the crew lay in an improvised morgue in Belle Valley.

ACCIDENTS REVIEWED.
(By the Associated Press.)

Several dirigibles being used or experimented with by various powers with a view to airship development in the post-war period, have met with disaster. The principal cases were as follows:

The French dirigible Diemudé fell into the Mediterranean December 21, 1923, after having presumably been struck by lightning, and the officers and crew, numbering 52 men, were all lost.

The dirigible Ziv-2, which was brought in England for the United States, met with disaster over the Humber river, August 24, 1921, her frame buckling. More than 40 persons, including 16 Americans, lost their lives in her destruction.

The giant army dirigible Roma, bought by the United States from Italy, crashed to earth in flames near Hampton roads army base February 21, 1922, and 24 men were killed.

The British dirigible H-34, which made the trans-Atlantic journey in July, 1919, was wrecked at her base by a strong wind on January 29, 1921. There were no fatalities.

Other ship accidents are: July 21, 1919, loss of 16 lives when an airship fell in flames into the Illinois Trust & Savings bank at Chicago.

July 15, 1919, British airship N-11 fell into the North sea with a loss of 12 lives after being struck by lightning.

June 20, 1914, airship and airplane collided at Vienna, killing nine.

September 9, 1912, Zeppelin L-1 destroyed off Heligoland with loss of 15 lives.

October 17, 1912, Zeppelin L-2 exploded over Johannisthal air-drome, killing 24.

July 2, 1912, the balloon Akron, groomed for a trans-Atlantic voyage, exploded at Atlantic City, killing five.

HIGHWAY ROUTE PENDS

BAKER, Ore.—A new route may be surveyed on the 12-mile Horsford-Mill gulch section of the Baker-City highway as the result of a proposed new reservoir, it was disclosed here.

A crew is ready to start a 2.7-mile graveling job near Love bridge across the Powder River, on the Baker-Cornucopia highway. Three miles of graveling is being laid near Halfway.

A survey on the North Powder-Muddy creek market road, on which a contract aggregating between \$20,000 and \$40,000 will be advertised, was said to be completed within ten days, said County Judge Dodson.

a crucial time had approached.

Methods Compared.
He compared methods of farming 20 and 25 years ago and the results with those of today. Mr. Miller remarked that at one time there was a general feeling that the land in the valley was inexhaustible but that this theory had, of course, proved erroneous and that a good deal of applied farming would be necessary to bring the soil back to the place it once was from the standpoint of production.

Mr. Miller's remarks prefaced a motion to ask the president of the chamber of commerce to appoint a committee to work with the county board in promoting the proposed trip to Yakima. This motion was unanimously passed.

Chief Radio Operator Olin Gilbert stated. He was born June 4, 1939, at Coal City, Ind. He enlisted in

the navy in 1917 as an apprentice seaman, later taking up radio work. He served overseas from 1917 to 1919 and in the latter year entered the naval aviation service. He took part in the bombing of German warships in tests off the Virginia Capes. For a time he taught radio in the naval aviation ground school at Pensacola, Fla., and then was sent to sea again. His home is at Terre Haute, Ind.

Aviation Mechanist's mate, First Class, William M. Bowlin. He was born at Roachdale, Ind., March 19, 1899. He enlisted in the navy in 1918, entering the aviation service the same year. He received his preliminary training at Great Lakes naval station and later qualified as a pilot at Pensacola, Fla. He was called from sea service to duty in the Hawaiian flight flag plane.

forever in the North Sea. He was awarded a Distinguished Service Medal. He acted as C. P. Rodgers in the transatlantic flight that won a first prize. Leaving aviation for a time, Commander Rodgers became executive officer of the U. S. S. Nevada. Later he returned to aeronautics as commanding officer of the naval air station at Pearl Harbor, Hawaii. He then was appointed master of the U. S. S. Wright, flagship of the aircraft squadron of the scouting fleet. He held this post when he was designated flight unit commander of the San Francisco-Honolulu non-stop project.

The first John Rodgers to figure in naval history served as an officer in 1776. He was known as "the bold, bald eagle of the seas." Since then has been a continuous line of John Rodgers in the navy, but the present flight commander has no sons to carry on the line.

Lieutenant Byron James Connell, second in command. He was born at Elizabeth, Pa., August 12, 1874. He was graduated from Pennsylvania State college in 1918 with the degree of bachelor of science in civil engineering. He immediately entered the naval aviation service, and after a ground course at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, he began flying at the naval base in San Diego, Cal. Later he was appointed flight squadron commander at Coco Cola, Canal zone.

In 1922 Lieutenant Connell was selected by the navy department to take a post graduate course in aeronautical engineering and in 1924 received the degree master of science from Massachusetts Tech. He put in the last year with scouting plane squadron No. 1 as pilot and engineering officer. He took part in the recent fleet maneuvers in the Hawaiian Islands. His home is at Pittsburg.

Chief Mechanist's Mate Skiles R. Pope, alternate pilot. He was born at Jackson, Tenn., October 13, 1894. He enlisted in the navy in 1913 and saw service in Mexico on the U. S. S. New Hampshire. During the World war he served overseas on the Arizona. He entered the naval air service in 1918 and in 1922 qualified as a pilot at Pensacola, Fla. His residence is Jackson, Tenn.
