Numerous Indications Exist Of Revival in Business World

Although business in most lines is still largely dominated by pessimistic influences, there are numerous indications of revival, both in production and distribution, declares the current issue of the "Guaranty Survey," which has just been issued by the Guaranty Trust company of New York.

"It is not yet possible to judge to what extent the increased activity may be attributed merely to the approach of the fall season, with its usual temporary stimulus to many important branches of the trade," the Survey continues. "But there is abundant evidence that the business community at large views with considerable confidence the probable developments of the autumn months.

"Recent reports have served to emphasize the fact that the present situation is fundamentally different from that which obtained a year ago. Not only is the normal volume of industrial output and distribution of goods materially greater, but the recessions of the last few months have been much less pronounced, signifying in many cases nothing more than the usual summer slackening.

"A higher level of activity is suggested also by the firmness of money rates and the increased volume of commercial loans reported by member banks of the federal reserve system. The range of true rates on the stock exchange has been visibly higher in recent weeks, and a firmer tone is reported in the market for common stock paper. Bank loans have increased to a point which would seem to indicate the probability of a less easy money market, with a firming of rates in the near future.

Building Industry Active.
"The activity of the building industry continues phenomenally high. With the continuance of construction in such extraordinary volume, there have been numerous comments to the effect that the situation portends elements of danger. Speculation regarding the continuance of the foundations for this wave of construction activity is nothing new. The susceptibility of real estate development to speculative influences has often been demonstrated. But experiences of this kind usually are confined to restricted localities, and are the outgrowth of special factors, such as discoveries of important natural

Tree That Once Was Indian's Lookout Aids Fire Fighters
LAKE ARROWHEAD, Cal. (AP)—One of the valuable aids to the United States forestry service in this mountainous resort section is a pine tree nearly 200 feet high, on the north shore of Lake Arrowhead. The tree serves the ranger lookout even as it served Indian warriors scores of years ago in tribal wars. At the base of the pine signs blazed in the past by the Indians may be seen dimly.

Camels Exchanged for Bullets.
BERLIN (AP)—In Abyssinia, camels are the most valuable possession of the people, in many instances being used as equivalent of money. Dr. Louis Heck, son of the director of the Berlin Zoological garden, learned this while in quest of animals for the zoo. However, he found some Abyssinians who regarded rifle cartridges higher in value than the animals. He succeeded in getting six drumsticks, which now are in the Berlin zoo, for 15 cartridges.
