POPULATION OF CITY IS DETERMINED

La Grande Has Grown More Than 30 Per Cent Since 1920 Census

U. S. GOVERNMENT RECOGNIZES RISE Federal Postal Population for La Grande District This Year Placed at 11,158 Persons.

Since the government census was taken in La Grande in 1920, the population of the city has grown from a little better than 7000 to a total of more than 10,000 inside and immediately adjacent to the corporate limits.
