Sister Mary Says:
 (By Sister Mary)
 Breakfast—Steamed prunes, cereal, thin cream, broiled bacon, northern pancakes, milk, coffee. Luncheon—Lamb scalloped with rice and tomatoes, graham bread, apple meringue pudding, milk.
 Dinner—Cream of celery soup, pork chops, candied sweet potatoes, scalloped corn, fruit salad, light food cakes, whole wheat bread, milk, coffee.
 With the coming of cool days, work is served occasionally. It must be well cooked and used rather sparingly.
 The luncheon dish is made with "remouade" or broth from the roast of the previous dinner.
 Apple Meringue Pudding
 Two cups thick apple sauce, 1/2 cup jelly of any flavor, 3 eggs, 1/2 cup powdered sugar, 1/2 teaspoon vanilla.
 If the apple sauce was sweetened in the making more sugar is unnecessary, otherwise add 1/2 cup granulated sugar. Fold in whites of eggs beaten until stiff and dry. Cover apple sauce with mixture and bake 20 minutes in a slow oven. Remove, cold with whipped cream slightly sweetened and flavored with vanilla.

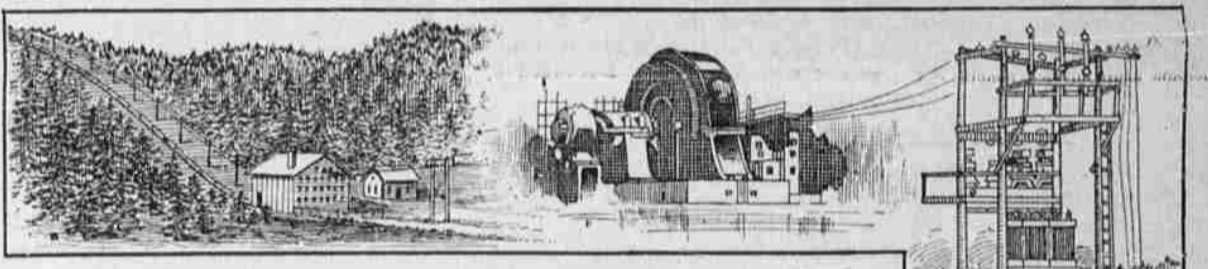
