## HOTEL WORK ADVANCING

MARSHFIELD, Ore.—Work on the Marshfield Hotel company's nine-story structure is progressing rapidly and the foundation will be completed soon. The structure will cost \$250,000. Seven store rooms on the main floor will be set apart for business houses. The foundation would carry a 20-story building, it is said. The date for completion is set for June 1, 1926. The building will provide 115 rooms at first and can be extended to provide 20 additional rooms. Lobby and bathroom floors will be in tile; the building will be fire proof; the three dining rooms will be on the mezzanine floor, and a special room for local meetings and functions also will be on the mezzanine floor.

rate a 24 per cent increase. In the fiscal year 1920-21 receipts were \$22,241.88 and in the fiscal year 1924-25 the figure was \$41,290.72, an increase of \$19,048.84. Government figures place the La Grande postal population, which also includes outlying districts served by the local post office, at 11,158. In 1920 the postal population was 8,000; in 1921—9,305; in 1922—9,585; in 1923—10,221; in 1924—10,400; and in 1925—11,158.

**BUFFALO HERD TOO LARGE.** WASHINGTON (AP).—Any person who can catch a buffalo bull from the government's herd in Yellowstone national park may have him—if he pays the cost. This includes, besides express charges to its new home, an expense of about \$10 for crating and transporting from the buffalo range to Harbin, Mont., the shipping point.
