Sister Mary Says:

Breakfast—Grapes, cereal, thin cream, soft cooked eggs, broiled bacon, crisp graham toast, milk, coffee.

Luncheon—Cream of mushroom soup, croquettes, celery, brown bread with raisins, squash pie, milk, tea.

Dinner—Veal stew with dumplings, baked sweet potatoes, succotash, fruit salad, toasted crackers with cheese, graham bread, milk, coffee.

Cream of mushroom soup is a

rich soup suitable for the main dish for luncheon. It should never be used as a dinner soup. It convenient chicken or veal stock adds to the taste as well as the food value.

Cream of Mushroom Soup

Two cups cleaned mushrooms, 4 tablespoons butter, 4 tablespoons flour, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, 2 cups milk, 1 cup cream, 1 tablespoon minced parsley.

Cook mushrooms in stock or water to cover for one hour. Keep sauce pan closely covered and simmer just at the boiling point. Rub mushrooms with liquor through a coarse colander. Melt butter without bubbling, rub in flour still, and pepper and slowly add milk and cream stirring constantly. Bring to the boiling point and boil five minutes. Add mushroom puree. Reheat without boiling and serve with parsley sprinkled over top.
