Greedy Employment Agencies For Movies to Be Abolished
HOLLYWOOD, Calif. (AP)—Elimination of all questionable employment agencies, make-up schools, schools for acting, scenario schools and other institutions of like pretensions is aimed at in the recent decision of the Association of Motion Picture Producers to maintain and operate a costing bureau of "extras" and day employees. The bureau will offer its service free.

The establishment of the bureau, the producers say, will abolish agencies which have charged movie workers 10 per cent and more for securing places in the pictures. The decision of the producers to look after employment "on a basis of absolute fairness" has been approved by the state labor commission.

Statistics show that the movie industry annually has more than 200,000 placements of casual labor.

Japanese Island Overrun With Destructive Bears
TOKYO (AP)—It is reported from Nemuro, Hokkaido, that bears are increasing so rapidly in Yutorop, the largest island in the Kurile group, that the inhabitants are seriously considering appealing to the Japanese government for aid. It is variously estimated that there are now between 8,000 and 10,000 bears on the island.

Hundreds of horses and cattle are killed and eaten by the bears yearly, it is said, and unless something is done to exterminate the brutes, it is feared stock-raising on the island will have to be discontinued. A bounty of 15 yen is at present given for each bear killed.

Death Claims Noted Italian Musician to Court of Japan
TOKYO, (AP)—Professor William Dubravovich, Italian violinist and the first organizer of the Imperial Court, died recently at the

Imperial University Hospital after an operation. He was 57 years old.

For 24 years Professor Dubravovich had been in the service of the Imperial Household Department as an instructor of the court musicians. He was studying music in Vienna when Count Makino, Lord Keeper of the Privy Seal, who was then Japanese Minister to Austria-Hungary, noticed his ability and recommended that he made instructor of western music for the Imperial Household Department.

A movement among Japanese musicians for the erection of a monument in his honor has been started. Professor Dubravovich had been decorated and raised to the rank of Chokuan.
