Sister Mary Says:

Breakfast — Chilled melon, wheat cereal cooked with dates, crisp toast, milk, coffee.
Luncheon — Squash soup, croutons, lettuce sandwiches, brown Betty, milk tea.
Dinner — Roast shoulder of lamb, buttered rice, creamed string beans, endive and orange salad, peach custard pudding, whole wheat bread, milk, coffee.

There are no dishes mentioned in these menus not suitable for a child of four years of age with the exception of the melon.

A hearty, bulky dessert balances the luncheon soup and with the sandwiches and milk makes a perfect meal for the average person of any age.

SQUASH SOUP

Four cups diced summer squash, 2 onions, 4 tablespoons butter, 3 tablespoons flour, 1/2 cup celery leaves, 2 sprays parsley, 1 sweet green pepper, 2 whole cloves, 1/2 teaspoon ginger, 1/2 teaspoon sugar, salt and pepper, 3 cups milk.

The squash should be cut in half inch dice, melt 2 tablespoons of butter in sauce pan, add squash and onion, cover, and simmer over a low fire until butter is absorbed. Stir in 1 tablespoon of flour, celery leaves and parsley minced, shredded pepper and cloves. Add boiling water to cover and simmer until squash is tender. Add 1 teaspoon salt 15 minutes before removing from the fire. Rub through a fine sieve. Add milk and bring to the boiling point, stirring to prevent burning. Rub remaining butter and flour together and stir into mixture. Cook, stirring constantly for 5 minutes. Season well with salt and pepper sugar and ginger and serve with 1 teaspoonful of whipped cream on each cup full.

Farm Pointers

The powdery disease of red clover, thought to have invaded the United States about 1922 from Europe, has again appeared this year in Oregon. Reporting cas-

es to the station at Corvallis will help in applying effective control measures.

The fungus consists of a powdery white coating on the leaves. Where abundant it will stunt the growth of the plants. As can be learned, injurious results do not follow the feeding of affected clover to stock of any kind. The unusually dry season may have been especially favorable and the disease may not become ac-

ious in Oregon, think the station specialists. It is done, either the clover producers will have to use a resistant type of clover or resort to applications of sulfur which are in general the best means of controlling diseases of this character. The disease has made rapid headway in many eastern clover growing sections of the United States and is creating considerable concern.

Fall is the best season to sort out and dispose of breeding ewes that fall below standard, says H. A. Lindgren, livestock specialist for the state college extension service. It will pay the owner to keep in mind a definite standard of type in building up a profitable flock, he believes. Disposing of those ewes showing the worst faults and mating the others to a good ram for several years will rapidly improve the flock without displacing too many ewes each year.

In culling out condemned ewes conformation is an important consideration because two-thirds the yearly return from a ewe is from the lamb she produces. Black faces, level rump, a well-filled leg of mutton, and well sprung ribs associated with a wide muzzle are outstanding points to be looked for in a desirable conformation. Broken mouths and spotted udders are sufficient to justify getting rid of breeding ewes. Her ability to produce a good lamb should also be considered.

Permanent Summer Time Dates Fixed by British Act

LONDON (AP) — Summer time will end this year in the morning of Sunday, October 4, says a notice from the Home Secretary's department.

Summer time in the future will begin at 2 o'clock Greenwich mean time on the morning of the day after the third Saturday in April, or if that is Easter Day, the day after the second Saturday in April. It will end at 2 o'clock Greenwich mean time on the morning of the day after the first Saturday in October.

This is in accordance with the Summer Time Act, which was recently passed, to establish summer time permanently.
