Noted Film Director Lauds Newspaper Writers' Talents

HOLLYWOOD, Calif. (AP).—Sidney Olcott, generally believed to be one of the three highest salaried directors in the motion picture business, recently expressed the conviction that the great screen writers and directors of the future will come from the ranks of newspaper men and women.

Olcott went a step farther and declared that the film industry should capitalize the "nose for news," trigger-like habit of decision, knack of getting details and close-up knowledge of human nature which he said every capable newspaper man or woman possessed.

Singling out Melville E. Stone, veteran counselor of The Associated Press, as an outstanding example to prove his point, the film director said that Mr. Stone embodied the requirements of a writer or director that would have carried him to the very top had he chosen to turn his talents into the field of the silent drama.

### Treasure Hunt Is Novel Feature Of "Any Woman"

Picture-goers who visit the Arcade theater Wednesday will have the opportunity of enjoying society's newest craze, "the treasure hunt." This game, in its most entertaining form, is one of the thrilling features of "Any Woman," a tremendously absorbing modern-day drama, based on an original screen story by Arthur Somers Roche, famous American novelist and short story writer.

"The treasure hunt" which originated abroad, among England's most exclusive social leaders, was taken up by royalty and copied throughout Great Britain until finally banned by an act of parliament.

"The treasure hunt" is a moving cross word puzzle, its success depending largely on the ingenuity of its conductor, usually the host at a week-end party. It may last a few hours and sometimes it extends over a period of three or four days.

on the undertaking of a railroad to bore a tunnel through the rocky mountains. Heavy blasting in the tunnel causes an avalanche which sweeps down the mountain carrying away buildings and a dozen in its path of destruction.

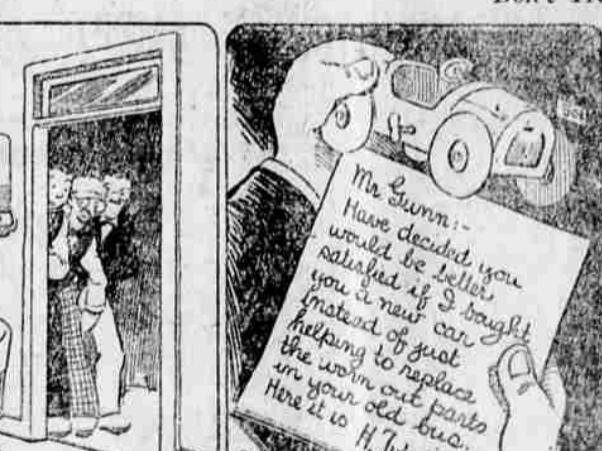
