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Hints for the Housewife

TAPIOCA TOMATO BISQUE
Cool days are already beginning to appear between warm spells and on such days it is good to have in mind some appropriate luncheon recipes which require only the simple ingredients, always to be found on the pantry shelf. The familiar tomato bisque is one that is sure to be well received, and to make it more inviting—just a little different and at the same time more healthful—tapoca is added.

To a pint of strained red tomatoes add two level tablespoons of butter, two level tablespoons of the kind of tapoca that does not require soaking, a tablespoon of sugar, a pinch of baking soda and an eighth teaspoon each of salt and pepper. Cook in a double boiler for fifteen minutes. An enameled ware double boiler will be found best because its vitreous surface will not interact with the acid in the tomatoes.

When ready to serve, stir the hot soup gradually into one and one-half pints of milk which has been heated to boiling point. (Never stir the milk into the to-

mate mixture as it may curdle). Serve with croutons, toast or crackers.

Eskimos Succeed at Raising of Foxes

NOME, Alaska (AP)—Frank De Freese, in charge of the Seward Peninsula for the United States biological survey, reports that Eskimos are taking a full part in developing the farming of foxes and the marketing of their pelts into a bounteous Alaska industry.

The south side of the peninsula is on Berling Sea and the north on the Arctic ocean. On the north coast line white men destroyed the Eskimo livelihood by annihilating the whales and burning the driftwood.

The Eskimos have taken to white foxes and some families are making incomes of \$200 annually. From catching wild foxes and selling the furs, the natives have gone on to developing simple ranches.

The women do most of the work—it's the aboriginal way—but, De Freese pointed out, families threatened with extinction are beginning to thrive, though rather sits around the cabin that has replaced the igloo.

FIRE PATROL WORK ENDS
EUGENE, Ore.—Lieutenants D. E. GaGarmo and A. R. Loomis, who have been on airplane forest fire patrol here during the summer, left for San Francisco Sunday in DeGarmo and Lieutenant Lloyd Hartnett's planes and returned today in DeGarmo's, expecting to leave again Wednesday for San Francisco, each in his own plane, thus closing the patrol work here.

Lieutenant Barnett, who had charge of the patrol in the northwest, expects to leave Saturday by automobile with his family. Headquarters here will be closed this week.

Klamath Falls Reports Typhoid
KLAMATH FALLS, Ore.—Two cases of typhoid fever developed here and a local dairy has withdrawn its operations pending an inquiry into the source of the typhoid germs. Dr. G. S. Newsome, county health officer, has sent samples of another dairy's milk to Portland for chemical analysis.

Sister Mary Says:

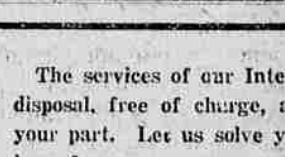

Breakfast—Baked apple with rolled oats, thin cream, crisp whole wheat toast, milk, coffee.
Luncheon—Baked corn and tomatoes, endive salad, brown bread, peach tapioca, milk, tea.
Dinner—Creamed salt codfish, baked potatoes, buttered beans, tomato salad, cheese sandwiches, fruit in gelatine with whipped cream, milk, coffee.

Keep in mind that made dishes are not as easily digested as plain foods but that they are of high caloric value. For instance the luncheon dish contains many more calories of nutrients in its combination than plain corn or tomatoes would.

BAKED CORN AND TOMATOES
Six slices of half-cooked bacon, 2 cups corn, 4 medium-sized tomatoes, 4 tablespoons dried bread crumbs, 1 tablespoon minced green pepper, butter, salt, sugar, buttered crumbs, 4 tablespoons grated cheese.

Line the bottom and sides of a baking dish with the bacon. Cover with the fine dried crumbs. Peel tomatoes and cut in thin slices. Sprinkle lightly with sugar and salt and dot with bits of butter. Sprinkle with half the minced pepper. Add corn cut from the cob, sprinkle with salt and sugar and dot with butter. Cover with tomatoes arranged as before. Cover with buttered crumbs and bake 30 minutes in a moderate oven. Sprinkle with cheese and return to the oven to melt the cheese.

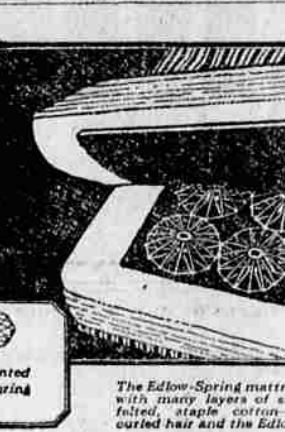
