Sociological Marriage Experiment Is Failure

DENVER, (Col. AP)—A sociological experiment through marriage resulted in failure recently when a divorce was granted Mrs. Mary Converse Essick, college graduate and daughter of an aristocratic Boston family. The decree ended her marriage to Charles Essick, a former convict of the Colorado penitentiary. Mrs. Essick was given the custody of their three children.

After receiving high honors in sociology and kindred sciences, Miss Converse left college and went to New York to engage in social service work in 1919. There she met Essick, who had been released a short time before from the penitentiary and had been aided by Thomas Mott Osborne, former warden of Sing Sing. Osborne gave the ex-convict a position in his prison investigation bureau in New York. As social workers the couple came together on an equal ground. Her studies imbued her with sympathy and understanding for the criminal. Thus their acquaintance developed into a romance.

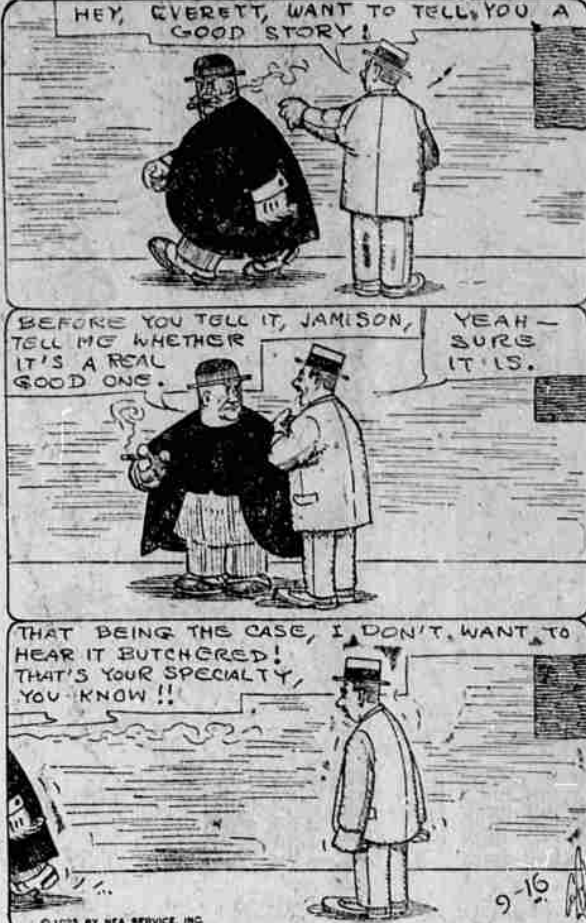
They were married Sept. 13, 1920, at Mount Hope, Ida., and went to live in Colorado.

Ruskin's Home to Be Sold LONDON, (AP)—John Ruskin's home, "Brantwood House," Coniston, Lancashire, where the poet lived for 25 years and died in 1900, is to be sold. In 1855 by deed of gift, Ruskin made over his house and contents to Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Severn, "praying they never to sell the estate of Brantwood, nor to let any portion of it upon building lease." He also requested that they "accord during 20 consecutive days in each year such permission to strangers to see the house and pictures as I have done in my lifetime."

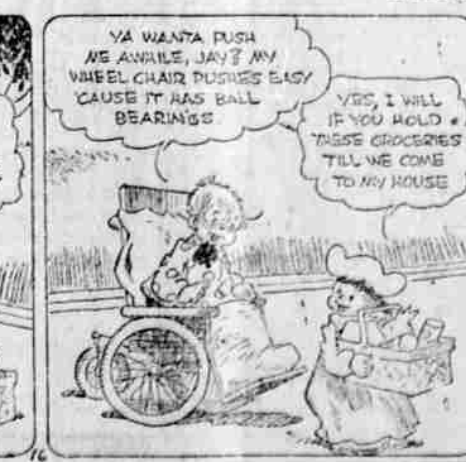
