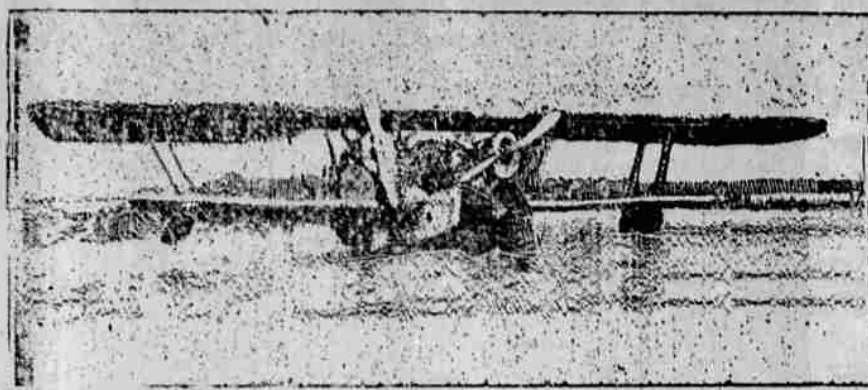

### Rescue Picture By Photoradiogram!



Here is the FN-9, No. 1, navy seaplane which was lost for nine days, as it was being towed into Kauai Friday, September 11. The picture was sent to NEA Service and The Evening Observer by Radio Corporation of America, broadcasted from Honolulu Sunday morning and received in San Francisco and New York simultaneously. This picture took 18 minutes to complete. A dot and dash principle, registering with hot wax on white paper is the secret of the amazing invention. Yet in an experimental stage, it is predicted that photoradiograms will become as faithful and accurate as a photograph itself.

### BRITONS ASK MOVIE ACTION

LONDON, (AP)—England's post-humane, Robert Bridges, is among many prominent men of the country who are greatly concerned over the decline of the British film industry. A circular letter explaining the present condition and the outlook of the movies has been issued principally for the members of parliament. Warning the nation's legislators that government action is necessary if England is to make any pictures at all. The letter bears the signature of Mr. Bridges, Lord Carson, Riddell and Burnham, Gordon Selridge, J. R. Clynes and Thomas Hardy. The authors of the letter believe that the government should constitute a committee to inquire into the conditions of the industry and principally with the idea of bringing out foreign films to displace British films and a chance to develop the local industry.

"We have in Great Britain approximately over 4000 cinema theaters and halls where pictures are shown and it is estimated that 20,000,000 attend the pictures each week, while the yearly receipts amount to about thirty millions sterling. Yet it is a humiliating fact that of the pictures exhibited not five per cent are of British production, all others having their origin abroad, mainly in the United States, although quite recently Germany has come forward as a serious competitor with the Americans in the production of what are known as super films. "What is the explanation of this state of things which we venture to describe as deplorable? It is precisely because there is as yet no authoritative reply to this question that we are venturing to address you and to make a public appeal to the Prime Minister to institute an inquiry and, at the same time, permit a judgment to be formed as to the measures which should be taken to establish a film industry in this country on a sound foundation."

controls them and discourages improvements by independent inventors. "It's a punishable offense," says Capt. Martin, himself a master mechanic, "to send a surface ship to sea without an adequate supply of fuel—not merely enough but a safe margin—for her port of destination. Yet this is just what was done with the FN-9 No. 1. "For a 200-mile voyage, she had even theoretically only a 100-mile margin of safety. It should have been at least a 100-mile margin. France has now and England is building planes with a 3500-mile range, carrying a 400-pound load. This same type of plane, when offered to our government, was rejected."

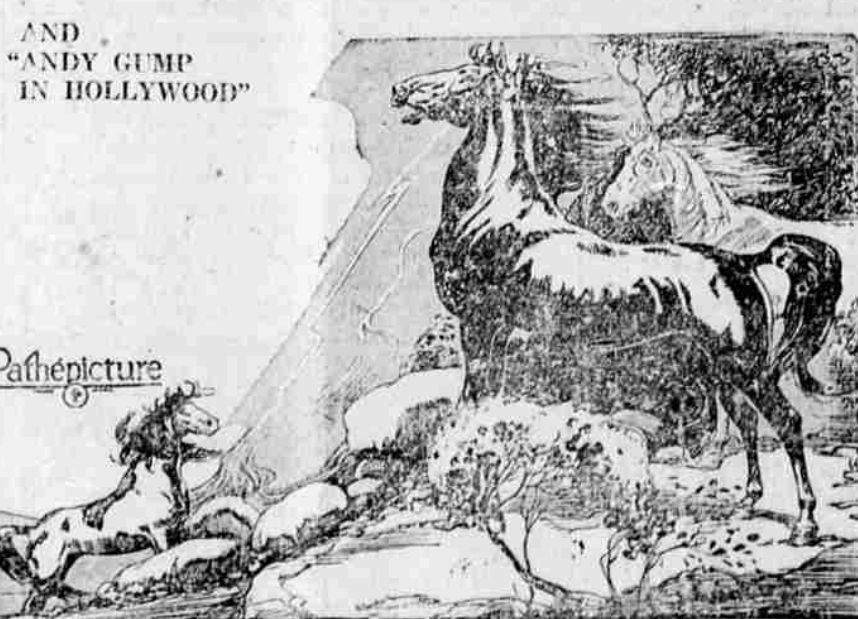
