FEDERAL AIR
LAW SOUGHT

WASHINGTON (AP) — Due to the diversity in legislation dealing with aircraft, a uniform federal law will again be sought in the coming session of congress.

Authorization for a bureau of air navigation in the department of commerce, to foster commercial aviation, is one of the proposals to be put forward in an effort to put flying on a better legal basis. Senator Bingham, Republican, Conn., is war time flyer, recently acquainted President Coolidge with his intention to push legislation for the new bureau. Last session Senator Wadsworth, Republican, N. Y., introduced a similar bill with the backing of Secretary Hoover, but it failed of passage.

The National Aeronautic Association recently found in a survey that 33 states and 12 municipalities have laws regulating the operation of aircraft. The Territory of Hawaii was the first state or territory under the American flag to pass aerial regulatory legislation, having enacted a law in 1917, although the community of Kissimmee, Fla., beat the country to it by enacting an air ordinance back in 1904.

Six states have laws prohibiting hunting from aircraft, and eight have laws governing the acquisition of municipal landing fields. Twenty-seven states are without air laws at all, have not replied to the association's inquiry.

The states having regulatory air laws, with the years passed, are: California, 1921; Connecticut, 1918-21-22; Delaware, 1923; Indiana, 1919; Kansas, 1921; Maine, 1923; Massachusetts, 1919-22; Michigan, 1923; Minnesota, 1921; New Jersey, 1921; Oregon, 1921-22; Utah, 1923; Vermont, 1923; and Hawaii, 1917.

Municipalities having air ordinances with the years enacted, include: Atlantic City, N. J., 1919; Chicago, 1921; Davenport, Iowa, 1921; Houston, Tex., 1923; Kissimmee, Fla., 1908; Los Angeles, Cal., 1920; Muskogee, Okla., 1921; New York, 1921; Newark, N. J., 1920; Norfolk, N. J., 1914; Santa Ana, Cal., 1921; and Venice, Cal., 1919.

AT LOW PRICES

LONDON (AP). — Castles are being sold in England at bargain rates. Historic mansions of various sizes and ages have been disposed of recently by members of the older aristocracy because of high taxes and death duties.

In other instances, drastic economies have been made in the administration of great estates, one of these being that of the Duke of Norfolk, who originally embraced some 50,000 acres. Arundel castle in Sussex, home of the 17-year-old duke, has been closed five years and there is talk of selling it. The Duchies of Norfolk gave up the castle for a modest cottage in Oxford to be near a son who is attending the university.

The most recent transfer of a castle at a low figure is that of historic Gwydyr in the vale of Conway, which was purchased by Jay Mitchell of Colwyn Bay for 2000 pounds. Gwydyr was the seat of a famous Welch family, the Wynns, until 1678. That part of the original castle which still stands was built in 1555 by Sir John Wynne and for generations has been a favorite haunt of noblemen. It was restored in 1828.

American tourists have found another place of interest to visit in Great Britain in Abergele castle, the Prince of Wales's Scottish residence near his father's estate at Balmoral. The particular object of curious interest is an unpretentious footprint of Wales in a concrete walk made when the royal heir was seven years old.

The story is that for 24 years the boy's footprint was known only to the prince and two servants present when it was made, but the secret became known to American tourists last year. Now this once quiet and almost deserted estate is said to be swarming with sight-seers.

Abergele often was visited by the prince and his parents before the latter became king and queen and the tale is that the young prince one day bounded across the turf and onto a newly laid pavement before a nurse and policeman could stop him. Last year the policeman broke a silence of nearly a quarter of a century and told the story to a visiting American.

The sizes of paper are to be standardized in England and the terms "ream" and "quint" used as measures for buying and selling since the time of Caxton are to become obsolete by an agreement arrived at by the association of master printers and the national association of wholesale stationers and paper makers. The ream will hereafter be replaced by 1,000 sheets to secure the advantage of decimal calculations for the trade.

Codification Session

WASHINGTON (AP) — One of the results that is considered likely to grow out of the twenty-

third conference of the Interparliamentary Union here, October 1 to 6, is a request to President Coolidge to call a conference for the codification of international law. This, if materialized, would supplement the work done along these lines at The Hague conferences.

The headquarters of the union here estimates that about half of the members of both the senate and house are members of the organization, and many among these are keenly interested in seeing a further step taken in international law codification. Enrollment by a member of congress is the only requisite for membership in the union.

The officers of the American group of the Interparliamentary union, which is acting as host at the conference, are: President, Senator McKinley of Illinois; vice-presidents, Representatives Montague, Virginia; Temple, Pennsylvania; and Oldfield, Arkansas; treasurer, Representative Sabath, Illinois; secretary, Representative McSwain, South Carolina. Arthur Brierley of Washington is its executive secretary.

The executive committee of the group comprises: Senators McKinley, Illinois; Swanson, Virginia; and Curtis, of Kansas; and Representatives Britton, Illinois; Burton, Ohio; Cooper, Wisconsin; McLaughlin, Michigan; Connally, Texas; and Barker, California.

The different schools of the county are receiving their portion of library books this week. These books were purchased through the State Library at Salem. Outside of La Grande over 300 books were delivered over the county. Cost of books this year \$477.46.

SUN'S RAYS DEADLY TO

Rattlesnakes, it was said, can be killed by exposing them for 20 minutes to direct mid-day summer sun. Snakes also are sensitive to cold and many are frozen to death every winter by hibernating above the frost line.

Ownership of Street
Cars Worries Seattle
SEATTLE, (AP)—While Seattle is paying \$332,332.32 a year and interest to purchase its street car system, taken over in 1919 from Stone & Webster of Boston for \$12,000,000, more and more Seattleites are taking to their work in their own automobiles, and the administration is alarmed at the decrease in business.
At the suggestion of David W. Henderson, manager of the system, advertising has been resorted to in an effort to urge the people to use the cars of the city lines. The motion and conductors are urged to help in the campaign if their request for increased pay were granted, but as this would amount to \$750,000 annually the offer was rejected by the city council.
William Pitt Trimble, city planning commissioner, has suggested that Seattle must start to build a new transit system. More speed, he argued, would make things pay. He urged immediate expenditure of \$4,000,000.
In the meantime the city has offered \$1,200,000 for the single private line remaining in the city. This was in response to demand from residents along that line, but its stockholders have objected that the price is too low.
