TERRIFIC SLUMP.
The failure of the Athletics to go the route has been a shock to the thousands of fans who were pulling for Connie Mack.

In the second division since 1914, public opinion was strongly with the astute and able Connie in his surprising comeback in 1925.

No one figured the Athletics as a serious contender in the spring, yet from the start of the season until Labor Day, the Mackmen were steadily in the running.

True, they are not yet mathe-

mathically out of the race, but the odds are strongly against them.

Many of the baseball experts predicted the Athletics would fall in the crash, basing their belief merely on the youth and inexperience of the team as a whole.

Now that the club has tattered in the home stretch some of the "I told you so" boys are having their lining.

"My club is going to be just as good as the players think it is," remarked Connie Mack to me this spring. "I feel that I have a great ball club. All I need to do is to get the players feeling the same."

A slump on the bases is the unusual, yet the Athletics in their long losing streak threw more games away because of poor baserunning than in any other manner.

With 100 games out of the way and the Athletics out in front by a fairly comfortable margin, I was convinced that the club believed in itself. I didn't look for the team to fade a bit.
