Luncheon — Cream of tomato soup, toasted bread sticks, celery and cheese sandwiches, pumpkin pie, milk, tea.

Dinner — Baker haddock with oyster sauce, scalloped potatoes, lima beans, pear salad, caramel bread pudding, graham bread, milk, coffee.

Celery, finely minced, is combined with cream cheese well seasoned with salt and pepper. If the sandwiches are not planned for young children minced green pepper can be added.

Pumpkin Pie Two Eightinch Pies

Two cups stewed pumpkin, 1 1/2 cups sugar, 2 tablespoons flour, 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon, 1 teaspoon ginger, 2 tablespoons molasses, 3 eggs, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 2 cups milk, plain pastry.
