big long-horns in 20 seconds flat. The best time in history was made by Frank Smith, who caught and threw his steer in 14 1/2 seconds. The fastest time of the day in steer roping was an exhibition given by Tony Vey of Pendleton, disqualified Wednesday when he lost his steer. The cowboy gave a steer roping exhibition Thursday while riding a horse that wore neither bridle or rope. Vey's time was 23 seconds.
In the northwest bucking contest, open to riders from Oregon, Idaho and Washington, 14 riders stayed with their mounts, and in the world's bucking contest, five buckaroos rode.
Four Persons Hurt.
There were four casualties but reports after the show from the emergency hospital were that none of the contestants was seriously hurt. Miss Jean Kreig, who rode in the exhibition cowgirl's bucking, was thrown and trampled, Jesse Stahl, colored bulldozer, was shoved against the arena fence by his steer and hurt and Moses Vannell, Indian youth, suffered the loss of one ear when he fell in the Indian war bonnet race and a horse stepped on his head, tearing off the ear. Chuck Morgan, buckaroo, was injured in the wild horse race.
Two of the government airplanes were partially wrecked at Arlington when one crashed into the other. One of the planes was driven by Lieut. Oakley G. Kelly, and the other was driven by Lieut. Jacob Berger of Seattle, a flying officer in the reserve.
Rynn Takes Part.
Paddy Ryan, who in 1924 won the world championship and the attendant Roosevelt trophy as the best all-around cowboy, is in the thick of affairs and is prepared to defend his honors when the competitors sit down to the finals on the last day.
The trophy must be won three successive years before it may be retained permanently by any cowboy. In 1923 it was won by Yakima Cabott, Indian buckaroo, who is also prominent in rodeo affairs here this year.
