When the Athletics met Washington in a four-game series starting later today, it was apparent to Mack that any hope to stick in the running depended on making a sweep of the series.

At the time Washington enjoyed a seven-game lead in the pennant race and the Athletics had lost 19 straight games.

Perhaps the most inconsistent pitcher on Mack's club this year has been "Lefty" Groves. Despite a world of stunts, Groves has been an in-and-out-er, largely due to lack of control.

Taking the first game of an important series is considered a big edge. Manager Harris of Washington entrusted the job to his pitching ace, Walter Johnson. Connie Mack put it up to the rookie, "Lefty" Groves.

The selection of Groves surprised, but in making it Mack was playing a hunch based on the strongest kind of dope.
