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MAJOR LEAGUE PENNANT RACE NEARING FINIS

NEW YORK (AP)—The long major baseball trail this week turns the corner to Pennantville, with Washington and Pittsburg only a few steps from the goal. Clinching of both championships beyond mathematical doubt during the next six days, has become possible as the result of giant strides which both leaders made last week.

With only a handful of games still to be played, the Senators and Pirates Sunday night appeared to have spurred beyond even the miracle stage from the viewpoint of the running-up Athletics in the American and the challenging Giants in the National.

The junior league leaders maintained their margin of seven and one-half games over Philadelphia last week by winning four of their six contests, while the Mackmen were taking five out of eight. Storming through shrinking opposition from Detroit and Chicago, the team of Stanley Harris packed heavy hitting behind steady pitching which was not forced to its limit of effectiveness.

Corsairs Impressive. The Corsairs were even more impressive in their six victories out of eight starts. Facing the club which had presented a bold front against them during their recent dash through the east, the McKeechie cohorts swept a three-game series with the Braves after thumping the stumbling Robins earlier in the week.

The next six contests of the National league leaders offer the possibility of Pittsburg putting the flag beyond the fleeting hopes of New York in the final series between the leading rivals on Thursday, Friday and Saturday.

BAKER SQUAD WILL BE FAST

BAKER, Ore. (Special)—Between 25 and 30 men out for practice every night, Coach Glindeman is making rapid progress on the gridiron and is expecting to turn out a winning team for the high school this year.

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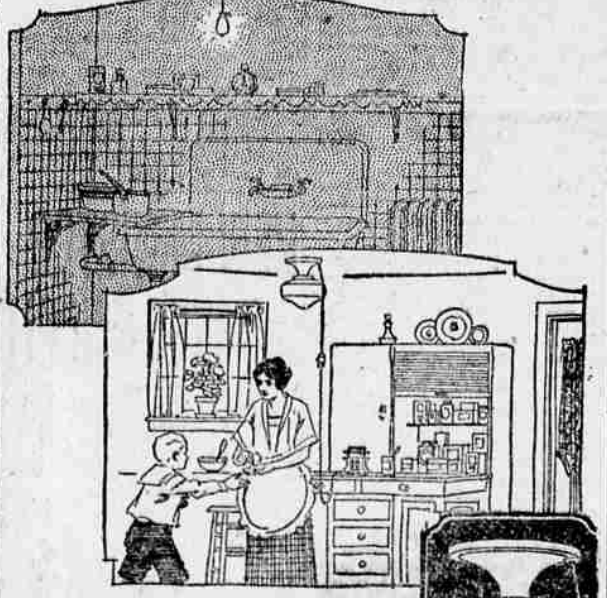
