AIR BOARD IS HEARING TESTIMONY

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Recommendations to the board:

1. That research and development of advanced types of aircraft should be continued and, when funds permit, expanded.

2. Additional personnel and material should be made available for the air service when government finances permit but not at the expense of other vital needs of the department.

3. A larger reserve of flyers should be built up when funds permit.

4. Any duplication in the army and navy service installation, if any still is existing, should be eliminated.

5. A clear delineation of the missions of the army and navy in coast defense should be adopted.

6. A bureau of civil navigation should be established under the department of commerce.

7. He also recommended improvements in housing conditions, appointment of an additional brigadier general to head the supply section of the air service and to develop industrial preparedness plans.

Major General John L. Hinds, chief of staff of the army, and brigadier general Hugh Denny, inquiring Davis, each described the air service as an important arm of the national defense, and strongly opposed a unified air service.

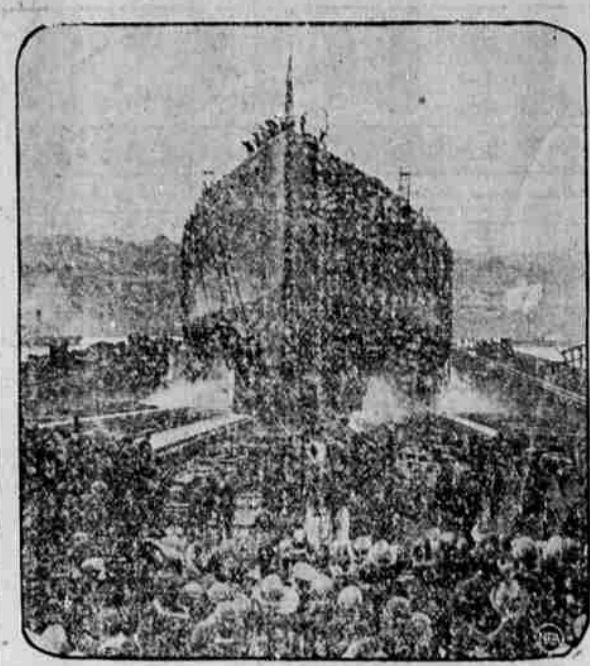

International Games Held in Germany

FRANKFORT, Germany (AP).—The first international Olympic games for working classes took place recently in the new Frankfort stadium and through the five days attracted more than 250,000 spectators. Competing athletes included 2,000 Germans and 1,600 foreigners. The latter represented Finland, Czechoslovakia, Austria, France, Belgium, Italy, England, Jugoslavia, Poland and Portugal.

The prominent qualification to compete was considered the advocacy of a war against all class distinction. The Social Democratic News Service described the games as "the birth of the peace idea in the most modern nations and typifying in classical style the thought of a genuine brotherhood among nations."
