the development of commercial aviation. Referring to lighter-than-air craft, Wilbur explained that the future policy in respect to dirigibles, is undetermined because of the Shenandoah disaster.  
**Eberic Agrees.**  
Rear Admiral Edward W. Eberic, chief of naval operations, naval air chief, and other high naval officers, backed Secretary Wilbur in his opposition to a unified air service. Without mentioning names, Admiral Moffett declared many erroneous and misleading statements about the air service had been recently given the country, and while the building plan approved by the service was not carried out because of inadequate funds, "it is considered our navy progressed further in aviation development than any nation of the world."

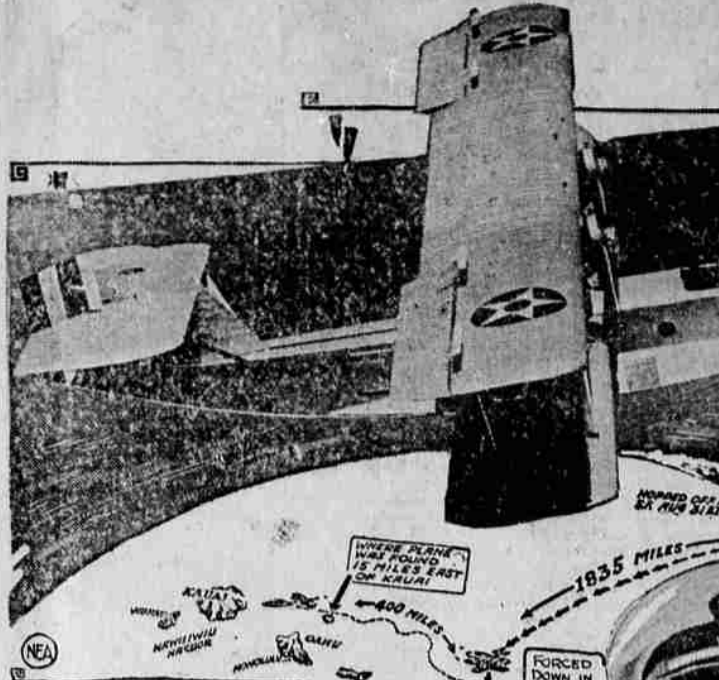
