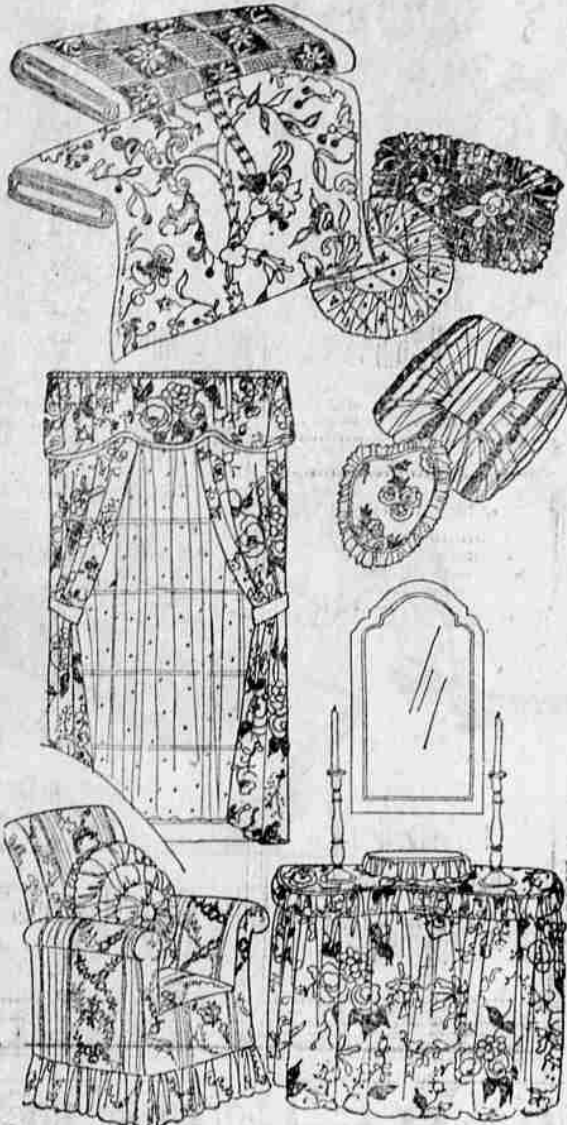

### Optimism Ruling Spirit At O.A.C. On Gridiron

O. A. C. CORVALLIS, Ore. (Special)—Optimism, not based on any individual occurrence, but on the general showing made by the men last week marks the keynote in the second week of varsity football practice.

Scrimmage started last Saturday and next Saturday a regular practice game will be played between two teams from the squad. On the showing made then the coaches will pick the starting lineup for the first game of the season—October 3 against Willamette university.

Four games are scheduled this year for the varsity on the home field, all of which come comparatively early in the season. The first game expected to test the strength of the Argies is October 19 when "Clippie" Smith brings his aggregation of Fishermen down from Gonzaga.

### Bold British Mariners Start Odd Lifeboat Test

LONDON, (AP)—In order to test a theory concerning supplies which should be compulsorily carried by ships' boats in case of disaster, and how far wireless equipment can aid seafarers who are compelled to take to their boats, three British mariners and a wireless operator have started on a 38,000 mile voyage. They left Newlyn, Cornwall, in a converted life-boat, 40 by 16 feet, supplied with power by a 15 horsepower internal combustion engine. The boat carries five tons of foodstuffs.

**VANCE'S RAIR FEAT**  
When "Dizzy" Vance, Brooklyn's great pitcher, set down the Phillies without a solitary safe seam the other day he turned in a rather unusual piece of work.

On both occasions Vance was just about as near to a perfect game as he perhaps ever will be.

In the first one, a single by "Chicken" Hawks robbed him of a place in baseball's hall of fame alongside of Eddie Jones, Cy Young and Charley Robertson. Hawks was the only foe to reach first base and as he was later caught stealing, only 27 batters faced Vance.

**LOW HIT GAMES.**  
Speaking of low hitting games, there have been quite a few during the last few weeks of play or
