Sister Mary Says:

(By Sister Mary)
Breakfast—Chilled apple sauce, cereal, thin cream, crisp granola toast, cornmeal pancakes, syrup, milk, coffee.

Luncheon—Tomatoes stuffed and baked, brown bread and butter, huckleberry pudding, milk, tea.

Dinner—Salisbury steak, cream of potatoes, buttered cauliflower, pear and celery salad, pumpkin pie, rice bread, milk, coffee.

These meals are planned with the heavy demands of training novices in mind. No woman busy with packing and carrying (nurs) to spend many extra hours in the kitchen making fancy desserts and salads and preparing elaborate meals. The menus are well balanced and provide nourishing food.

Tomatoes Stuffed and Baked. Cut a slice from the stem end of a smooth, medium-sized tomato, remove seeds and sprinkle the inside of the shells with salt, sugar and a few grains of pepper. Add 1 teaspoon of butter to each tomato. Combine cooked spaghetti with rich white sauce to make meat, and for each cup of spaghetti add 1/2 cup grated cheese. Fill tomatoes with mixture and grate cheese over tops. Arrange in baking dish and bake 20 minutes in a hot oven.

Baked rice, macaroni or spaghetti can be used in place of spaghetti if convenient.

Here And There

(By the Associated Press.)
LAKEHURST, N. J.—A failure of one or more girders forward of the ship's bow caused the wrecking of the ship *Shenandoah* in the opinion of Commander Sidney M. Kraus, of the special investigation board who testified Tuesday before the naval court of inquiry.

Basing his opinion upon a personal observation of the wreck and upon such information about the disaster as he could collect, he said this failure occurred simultaneously with or shortly before or shortly after some very considerable rotational oscillation of the ship in the line square near Ava, Ohio, on September 3.

KANSAS CITY, Kan.—Western railroads were convinced of the necessity for asking interstate commerce commission for a 5 per cent rate increase before they dared confront public opposition.

L. V. Baldwin, president of the Missouri Pacific railroad, said here Tuesday, Mr. Baldwin addressed the local chamber of commerce.

FEZ, French Morocco.—The rainy season and winter coming on apace are Abd-el-Krim's most powerful allies and the Moorish chieftain makes no secret of this fact in his appeals to his followers. On the other hand, the French command asserts that offers of submission continue to come in.

INDIANAPOLIS.—John J. McNamara, 49-year-old business agent of a local iron workers' union, again faces imprisonment as a result of a labor dispute. A jury in criminal court Tuesday found him guilty of the technical charge of blackmail, which carries a prison term of one to five years. He, the state charged, threatened a workman of another craft employed on the new Elks' building, finally driving him from the job.

HOUSTON, Tex.—"A protective quarantine will be placed over 19 counties nearest to infested areas of the foot and mouth disease Tuesday night or Wednesday morning and the government's fight on the disease on Galveston county will be resumed immediately," Dr. Marion Innes, district chief of the bureau of animal industry, announced Tuesday after an injunction had been dissolved at Galveston.

WASHINGTON.—Any known Communist members of the Italian parliament who attempt to come to the United States to attend the inter-parliamentary conference at Washington will be excluded.

WELLESLEY, Mass.—Attacks upon and defenses of the "dollar down and dollar a week" system of buying America were heard Tuesday at the twelfth annual national business conference at Babson Park, a suburb.

"If the present rate of increase of installment sales continues it will be only a short time before a housewife will order a steak on the agreement that she is to pay 10 cents a week for it," said William Nelson Taft, editor of the Retail Ledger.

DES MOINES, Iowa.—The Rev. N. C. Carpenter, former klan member of the Ku Klux Klan here, resigned as pastor of the Capitol Hill Church of Christ Sunday after a

conference with prominent members of his congregation. Mr. Carpenter declared he was not receiving the co-operation of his full congregation while a board member, addressing the conference, said the minister had made untold charges against some of his followers.

GENEVA—Confirming the plans of the leaders, the league of nations assembly in plenary sessions of the commission Tuesday laid the foundations of future international disarmament and economic conferences.

SANTA BARBARA, Cal.—With the earthquake just 12 weeks behind, many business institutions of the city were able to announce complete restoration Tuesday, as a score of protecting scaffolds were simultaneously removed, repairs and rebuilding having been completed.

CHICAGO—Dr. John Roach Straton, pastor of Calvary Baptist church, New York City, recently challenged by the Chicago Evening Post to give the details of the two holdups he had told of witnessing in Chicago one day, has applied in such detail that the newspaper announced Tuesday it had paid the \$100 it had offered to give to charity as reward for the information.

The Post explained, however, that there was no record of the two holdups in the Chicago police department.

HONOLULU—Reviving the enforcement of the famous beach bathing suit law, which proscribes that bathers must wear a covering over their bathing suits when passing to and from the beach, the police swooped down on Waikiki beach Monday and arrested 15 young women.
