## Plan Botanical Garden On Oahu Island, Hawaii

HONOLULU (AP)—The island of Oahu will be made a Pan-Pacific botanical garden under plans of the Pan-Pacific biological commission and suggested by Willis T. Pope, horticulturist at the United States agricultural experiment station.

Numerous sites have been offered where food trees and plants from Pacific lands may be planted and cultivated. Different altitudes, different amounts of moisture and elements of climate are required for various plants and most of these requisites are found on the island. It is possible, however, that the higher slopes of the extinct volcano center of Mauna Kea, island of Hawaii, also will be utilized for the cultivation of fruit and other food trees from temperate zones in the Pacific area.
