Comedy showing, "Oh! Bridget," Savant Works on Artificial Propagation of Oysters

BETHLEHEM, Wash. (AP)—The problem of artificial propagation of oysters may have been solved by Professor Trevor Kincaid of the University of Washington zoology department on the beds of Sanish Bay near here this summer. He has kept the young of Eastern and Japanese oysters alive for two weeks and believes that that process can be worked out successfully.

The discovery would be a boon to Pacific Coast oyster beds, most of which are in Puget Sound and in other inland waters of the state, local growers say. So far it has been necessary to import seed of the bigger oysters from the Atlantic and Japan beds, as the cold water here would kill the spawn at once.

RUNAWAY OPENS BRIDGE MILL CITY, Ore.—That runaway horse do not believe in signs was demonstrated here. Men were repairing the flooring on the large bridge across the Santiam river, having large signs at both ends that the bridge was closed. Considerable material was
