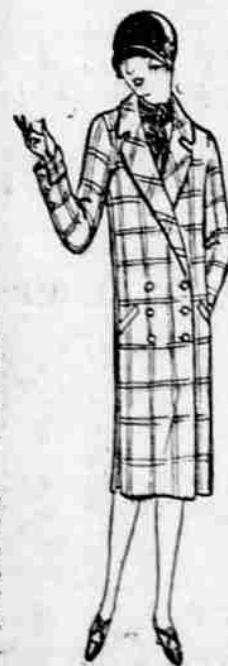

WASHINGTON (AP)—Washington captured its second consecutive American league pennant yesterday and will face Pittsburg, which clinched the National league title Wednesday, in the world's series starting at the latter city October 7.

The American league race ended suddenly as the champions took two games from Cleveland Thursday while St. Louis came from behind to win at Philadelphia, sole remaining contender, in an 11-inning contest.

"It is a great feeling," Stanley Harris said. "It is a great relief to have it over and I am certainly proud of the team."
