Sister Mary Says:

Breakfast—Baked apples, cereal, thin cream, fried tomatoes in cream sauce on toast, crisp Graham toast, milk, coffee.

Luncheon—Eggs baked in tomatoes, brown bread and butter sandwiches, ginger bread, sliced bananas and peaches with cream, milk, tea.

Dinner—Lamb stew, baked squash, endive with bacon dressing, each cobbler, whole wheat bread, milk, coffee.

September mornings are often cool and a hearty breakfast is appreciated. Children particularly need a more substantial meal after school begins than during the summer months.

As long as fresh tomatoes are available it's a good plan to use them whole. There are the winter months coming when they must be used canned so when they appear use contrive some way out of the ordinary.

Eggs Baked in Tomatoes

Four small tomatoes, 4 eggs, 4 squares toast, dried bread crumbs, butter, salt and pepper, 4 tablespoons grated cheese.

Dip tomatoes into boiling water, let stand half a minute and then plunge into cold water. Slip off skins. Cut a slice from the stem and remove seeds. Sprinkle salt over the inside of the tomatoes and dust them, inside and out, with the crumbs. Put into ramikina or well-buttered muffin pans and break an egg into each tomato. Sprinkle with salt and pepper, dot with butter and cover with cheese. Bake in a moderate oven

Kansas Finds 2 States Regulating Hotels

TOPEKA, Kan. (AP)—Hotel regulation by commissions created solely for that purpose is performed in only two states, Kansas and Florida, Phil E. Zimmerman, hotel commissioner in Kansas, has determined after making a survey of the entire country. The hotel commissions of Kansas and Florida were created by legislative enactment the same year, 1913.

"Twenty other states have hotel regulation in some degree," Mr. Zimmerman learned.

"But inspection and supervision of hotels in those states are inadequate for larger circuses," he said. "Such functions of the state are performed by board of health, fire marshals, public utilities commissions, welfare boards or other bodies."

Those twenty states are Minnesota, Washington, Wisconsin, Alabama, South Dakota, Kentucky, Idaho, Nebraska, Arkansas, New Mexico, Utah, Oklahoma, Iowa, North Dakota, Tennessee, South Carolina, California, Vermont and Ohio.

witnesses in the Murray case will include prison officials and employer who were on duty at the time of the break.

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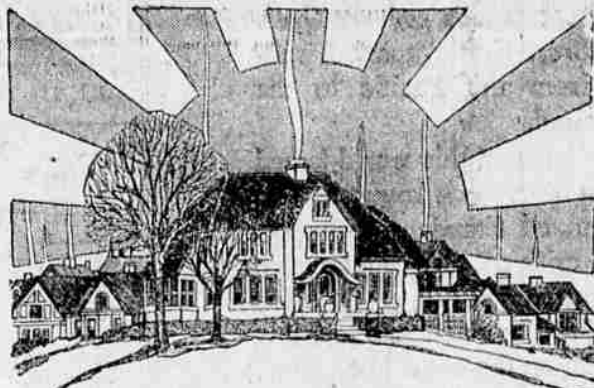

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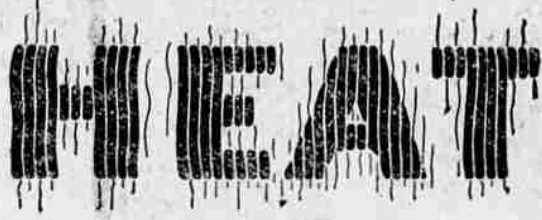

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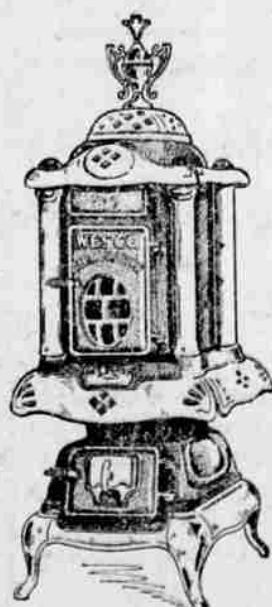
