Sister Mary Says

(By Sister Mary) Breakfast—Baked poached, cereal, thin cream, coffee puffs, sliced tomatoes, cornmeal muffins, milk, coffee.

Luncheon—Cream of cauliflower soup, croquettes, lettuce sandwich, another baked apples, milk, tea.

Dinner—Broiled porterhouse steak, baked potatoes, creamed corn, stuffed celery, golden glow pudding, white bread, milk, coffee.

The peaches suggested for breakfast are just plain baked without any frosting.

When children must carry their luncheon to school try to include a vegetable in their breakfast.

Cold sliced tomatoes served simply with salt are delicious for breakfast.

Smothered Baked Apples

Four medium-sized apples, 1 cup stewed dates, 1 cup chopped nut meats, 1 egg white, 4 tablespoons sugar. Pare apples and cut in halves. Remove core and fill the cavities with half the sugar. Place in a baking dish, cover and bake covered until half done. Remove cover and bake until tender. Beat white of egg until stiff and dry. Beat in remaining sugar and fold in stewed fruit and nuts. Cover apples with mixture and bake in a moderate oven for eight minutes. Serve cold.

Breakfast—Baked pears, cereal, thin cream, creamed fish on toast with broiled tomatoes, bran muffins, milk, coffee.

Luncheon—Vegetable soup, croquettes, celery, chocolate bread pudding, milk, tea.

Dinner—Pricaise of lamb, baked potatoes, toasted string beans, stuffed apple salad, pumpkin pie, whole wheat bread, milk, coffee.

Vegetable Soup Two carrots, 1 small turnip, 1 medium sized onion, 1 sweet green pepper, 2 stalks celery, 2 cabbage leaves, 4 cups sliced tomatoes, 2 whole cloves, 2 sprigs parsley, 1 bay leaf, 1 1/2 cups corn from the cob, 2 teaspoons salt, 1 teaspoon sugar, 2 teaspoons butter, 1 tablespoon flour, 3/4 teaspoon pepper.

Wash and peel onion, pare carrots and turnip and remove seeds and white pith from pepper. Put these vegetables with celery and cabbage through food chopper. Put into soup kettle, cover with boiling water and simmer 15 minutes. Add tomatoes pared and cut in small pieces, with cloves, parsley and bay leaf. Add 2 cups boiling water and cook about 45 minutes, stirring frequently. Add the corn, undrained, salt, sugar and pepper and cook 10 minutes longer. Add butter and flour rubbed together and boil five minutes, stirring constantly. Put through a vegetable sieve, reheat and serve.

The soup need not be strained unless children under school age are to eat it.
