Marketing Discussed At Grange Meetings — Mr. Hurd added his encouragement of the plan for a public market in La Grande, and as an illustration of what had been done with the idea in other Oregon towns, told of the experiment at Eugene, where the market increased the per capita consumption of home grown farm products 250 per cent in ten years. Merchants of the city contended this covering a new building when the market had outgrown its original quarters because they found their business improved rather than injured by the competition. Success of the market, he impressed upon the grangers, will depend upon their displaying a variety of vegetables on display every day.

The part that quality and attractiveness will play in the history of the proposed market was emphasized in the speech of C. E. Spence, state market master.

"No Sentiment"—Spence. "There is no sentiment connected with it. You must furnish housewives with better vegetables at lower prices than they can find at the store, or you won't get their patronage," he said. "Most of the fruit and vegetables sold in your city are bought outside the community. The biggest reason for this condition is that when merchants are supplied by companies organized to do business, they know they have recourse to adjustment when complaints have to be made. The way to overcome this handicap is to provide good produce regularly and

in attractive shape. Grow what there is demand for, and then prove that your goods can be relied on for quality."
