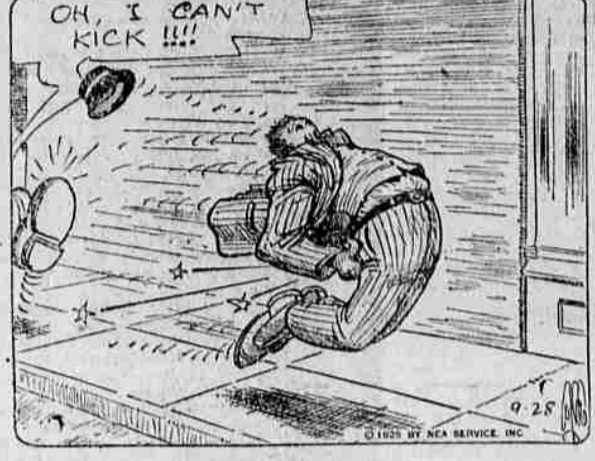

Religious Workers of Japan

Banned From Political Parties TOKYO, (AP)—Religious workers of Japan are complaining again at what they term "unjust discrimination" shown them in the field of politics. While they are given a vote, under the new police regulation prohibits all religious workers, including Buddhist, Christian and Shinto priests, from joining any political party.

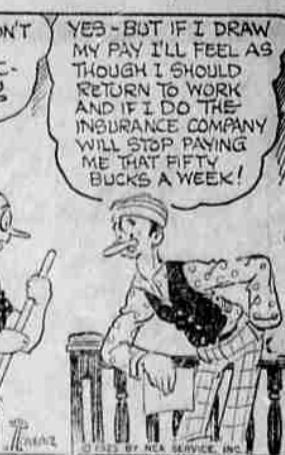
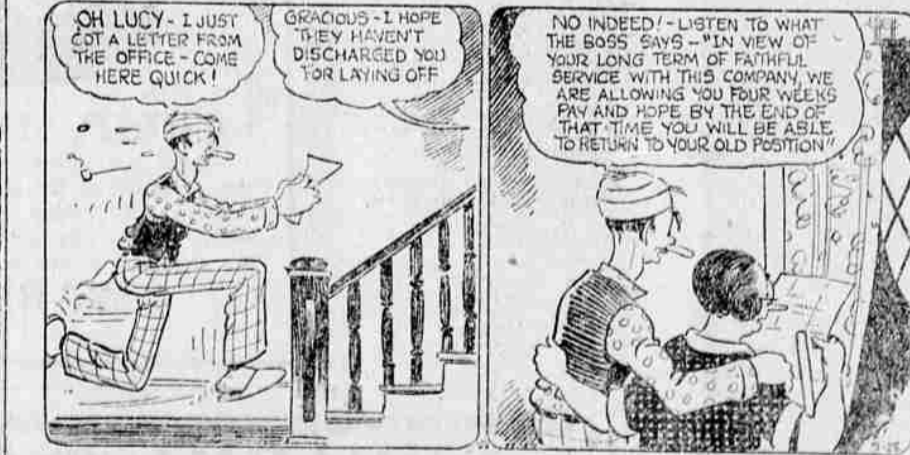
