WORLD SERIES FACTS
 In all the years the blue ribbon classic of baseball has been staged, there have only been four occasions wherein a winner one season has come back to repeat the following campaign.

In 1905, the Chicago Cubs turned the trick by beating Detroit, after having whipped the same outfit the year before. The Athletics did it in 1911, knocking out the Giants after trimming the Cubs the previous fall.

The next team to come through with a pair of successive triumphs was the Red Sox, defeating the Dodgers in 1918, after having tripped the Phillies in the 1915 classic.

Then came the Giants to follow their 1921 victory over the Yankees with a similar lacing a season later. Those four clubs, the Cubs, Athletics, Red Sox and Giants, stand out as the only repeaters in world series encounters.

NATS HAVE CHANCE.
 This fall Washington will have a chance to get into the repeater class. A victory over Pittsburg in the

play-off next month would put them on an even basis with the Cubs, Athletics, Red Sox and Giants.

Whether or not the Harris entourage can put it over remains to be seen, of course. It may duplicate its stellar performance of last year against the Smoky town outfit this fall. And then again, it may not.

According to past performances of pennant-winning aggregations, the chances are considerably against Washington coming through successfully. For only four teams have accomplished the feat over a stretch of 20 seasons, making it quite a long shot from a merely statistical standpoint.

But figures mean little in sportsdom, so Washington rooters shouldn't let the "odds" bother them to any appreciable extent.

In a word, it's sort of interesting stuff for the so-called "figure filberts," but that's about all.

Jack Dempsey, Harry Wills Sign to Fight

SOUTH BEND, Ind. (AP) — Jack Dempsey and Harry Wills came to terms late Tuesday afternoon for a heavyweight championship fight in Michigan City, Ind., in the fall of 1926, and left immediately for Niles, Mich., just over the Indiana state line, to sign articles.

Faddy Mullins, Wills' manager, signed first, followed by Wills, Dempsey and Floyd Fitzsimmons, promoter of the match. The party stayed at Niles only long enough to sign the papers and then motored to South Bend, a half hour ride away. The trip to Niles was for the purpose of signing in a state which legalizes prize fighting, prize fights being prohibited in Indiana. The principals decided to take no chances on legal technicalities.

World Series Players

Roger Peckinpaugh, Senators.
 Obtained by Washington in one of the big trades of baseball, Roger T. Peckinpaugh, shortstop and assistant manager, became the mainspring of the Senators' machine of inner defense and covered himself with glory in the 1924 world's series after somewhat of a failure in a similar series when he was short-stopping for the New York Americans.

Born at Wooster, Ohio, on February 5, 1891, Peckinpaugh moved to Cleveland in his early youth and began playing ball there. Napoleon Lajoie was at his side then and he became young Roger's hero although then little did he think that one day he would play beside him.

Developing into a star on a high school team, Peckinpaugh was signed by Cleveland at the age of nineteen, but was farmed first to New Haven in the Connecticut league and then to Portland in the Pacific Coast league. Localized in 1912, he became a regular with Cleveland, but in the year following "knajab" as he was called by fans almost everywhere, was traded to the New York Americans and captained them to an American league championship before he was obtained by Washington in 1922.

Bleue, Senators.

With only seven years of actual play behind him and at the age of 24 Oswald Lewis Bluege, a finished third baseman has won, indisputably, a pivotal place in a world's championship infield.

Born in Chicago on October 20, 1900, Bluege had no opportunity to play ball until he was sixteen. He was a frail youngster and the doctors advised him against too violent exercise, but once he got to an athletic field, Bluege threw advice to the winds and went in for football, baseball and basketball. He deserted the other two for the national game and soon began to shine at shortstop.

He quickly graduated into a semi-professional team and Peoria, of the Three-I league signed him in 1920. Within a year four major league teams were bidding for him seriously, with Washington successful. With the veteran Peckinpaugh at short, Bluege was transferred to third. He had indifferent success in the first season there and was farmed to Minneapolis in the American association. At the end of the season he was recalled and improved so rapidly that he soon became a regular with Washington, getting his baptism in the world's series last year both as a third baseman and as a shortstop when injuries forced Peckinpaugh to the bench.
