### HARDING PARK PLANS MOVING

**PENDLETON, Ore.** (Special)—Creation of a park to perpetuate the memory of the late President Warren G. Harding is the purpose of the Harding Memorial Park association for which incorporation papers have been sent to Salem by Frederick Steiner, of Pendleton, chairman of the organization committee which has been working on

the plans for forming the body during the past year. The park will be created on land in the Blue mountains not yet definitely selected. It will be near Meacham and will be on the Old Oregon trail, Mr. Steiner declared.

Membership in the association will be drawn from the three northwest states, Idaho, Washington and Oregon, according to the plan of organization in the articles of incorporation. The executive committee will consist of 50 members. Of this number, not to exceed 25 shall be chosen as ex-officio as may be from among public office holders in the three states from officers in state-wide educational, patriotic, political or historical organizations. The board of trustees, consisting of 15 members elected for five year terms, will have control of the business management of the association.
