Obituary O. M. DODSON, BAKER, Ore. (Special) — Dr. O. M. Dodson, 55, for 43 years a prominent citizen of Baker, died at his home here yesterday. Funeral services will be held at the Elks' temple at 2 p. m. Saturday. Serv-

ices there will be in charge of the Elks while those at the grave will be conducted by the Masonic order. Burial will be in Mount Hope cemetery.

O. M. Dodson was born in Athens, Tenn. An ardent republican and Unionist, he enlisted as a private in the first Kentucky cavalry of the Union army and during the war rose to the rank of major of the Seventh Tennessee mounted infantry, though he was under 23 when the war ended.

After the war he migrated to California. In 1874 he came to Oregon and entered Willamette university. After his graduation there he came to eastern Oregon and lived in Grant county for two years. He then went to New York and studied medicine. He returned to Baker in 1882 and lived here since that time.

He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Belle Dodson, and four children, Dr. Ralph Dodson of Portland, Fred Dodson of San Francisco, Miss Roe Dodson of Baker and Mrs. Leland S. Finch of Baker.
