Colorful players do much to popularize the sport. Most stars are of that type. They have certain qualities that endear them to the public.

Cobb won his spurs because of his all-around ability plus his fiery style.

Walter Johnson first won fame because of his terrific speed.

This Speaker became a national idol because of his marked ability in all departments but particularly because of his uncanny fielding.

Babe Ruth because he can hit them farther than any human being.

The stars cannot go on forever. There comes a time when nature claims him. It is well if the star gives out to the warning and retires before it is too late.
