Walks Half Mile After Losing Arms

N. R. Wood, La Grande Brakeman, Is Accident Victim; Hopes Held for His Recovery.

With both arms ground off close to his shoulders by a freight train from which he fell after signaling for a clearance at the Oro Dell viaduct west of La Grande at about 11:50 p. m. Sunday, Nephie Robert Wood, 37, a brakeman living at the corner of Union and Albany streets, dragged himself from the rails and walked half a mile to the brick yards for help.

That the train could pass over Wood's arms so close to his body without severing his head is accounted a miracle by those who cared for him last night.

Mrs. Wood was called as soon as her husband had been taken to the hospital and is there with him now. They have two small children at home.

PURCHASES 22,000,000 FEET PINE

Mount Emily Lumber Co. Acquires Large Timber Holdings

ANNOUNCEMENT IS MADE TODAY

250,000 Feet of Lodge Pole Pine and Other Five Point Growth Is Awarded.

PORTLAND, Ore. (By the Associated Press)—The sale of 22,000,000 board feet of yellow pine, 250,000 feet of lodgepole pine and an unestimated amount of other timber in the Unwilla national forest was awarded today by the forest service to the Mount Emily Lumber company of La Grande.

The price paid was \$2.75 a thousand for yellow and lodgepole pine and 50 cents for other timber. The timber is located on Five Point creek.

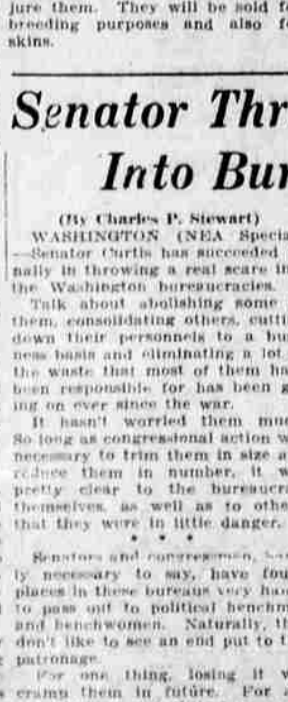
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TORPEDO BOAT SINKS; 53 DIE

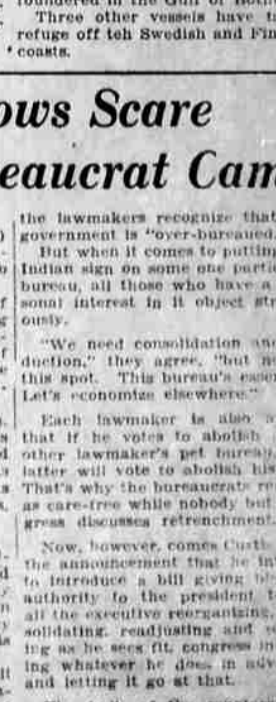
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County Superintendent To Visit All Schools
