FUNCTIONS HELD TOO EARLY

PRINCE OF WALES SLEEPS BUENOS AIRES (By the Associated Press)—While cabinet ministers, diplomats, functionaries and thousands of school children anxiously awaited the arrival of the Prince of Wales to attend a school festival arranged in his honor during his visit to Buenos Aires, the heir to the British throne slept profoundly in the magnificent private residence placed at his disposal during his stay here.

Tired out by a ceaseless round of official functions, the prince refused to leave his bed at the early hour the school feast should have begun, which nevertheless was carried out in his absence.

A similar occurrence took place during a trip made by the royal visitor to a large ranch in the province of Buenos Aires, where a rodeo and horse-racing exhibition had been prepared in his honor. When the train carrying the prince arrived at the railway station near the ranch in the early morning the prince remained in bed, appearing when the show was over.

Sister Mary Says:

By Sister Mary
Breakfast—Orange juice, cereal, thin cream, broiled bacon, soft cooked eggs, bran muffins, milk, coffee.

Luncheon—Meat balls, celery hearts, raisin bread, grape tomato pudding, milk, tea.

Dinner—Spanish steak with fresh mushrooms, mashed potatoes, creamed corn, tomato and pepper salad, jellied pears with whipped cream, white bread, milk, coffee.

The coarse outer stalks of celery for soup or creamed celery. And now is the time to dry the celery leaves that are well bleached. The dried leaves are excellent for winter soups when fresh celery is high in price and not always at hand.

Meat Balls
Two cups mashed potatoes, 1/2 cup finely chopped, cold cooked meat, 1 tablespoon minced parsley, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 2 eggs.

Combine potato, meat, parsley, salt and pepper. Add yolks of eggs well beaten. Beat mixture well and fold in the whites of the eggs beaten until stiff and dry on a platter with a wire whisk. Shape in small balls, brush over with melted butter and brown in a hot oven. Left-over ham is delicious used in this way.

BEST RAISING MAY SUPPLANT SUGAR CANE IN LOUISIANA

BATON ROUGE, La. (By the Associated Press)—Sugar cane, long a staple crop in Louisiana, may lose its enticement in the list of the state's agricultural products if sugar beet growing proves successful.

Cane crops have been beset by many plagues, the most recent being the borer, and is proving perilous. Mosaic disease and root rot also have attacked cane. Sugar planters have asked that the sugar house at the new Louisiana state university be provided with machinery for refining beet sugar as a part of the experiment planned next year.

More than 100 acres of sugar beets will be planted in various sections of the "sugar belt" of Louisiana next year.
