Big Six Dies



Christy Mathewson, "Big Six" of baseball and president and part owner of the Boston Braves, died here at 11 o'clock Wednesday night. Death, according to his physician, was due in cerebral pneumonia. Mathewson was one of the greatest pitchers the game has ever produced. He helped to win championships for the New York Giants in 1904, 1905, 1911, 1912 and 1913. For 13 years (from 1902 to 1914) Mathewson maintained prominence in the baseball world, his holding for him an admiration akin to that now shown for Babe Ruth.

TIMBER FIGURES GIVEN
EUGENE, Ore.—Nearly 6,000,000 feet of timber with a value of \$10,064,511 was taken off the Cascade national forest during the third of the year ending September 30, according to a report issued by A. T. Moses, chief clerk in the forest office. The exact number of board feet was 5,934,325. This makes a total of 16,152,554 feet for the year to date, with a total value of \$26,661,701, the report states.

GONZAGA WILL TEST AGGIES

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, Ore. (Special)—In spite of the strength shown by the Aggie Saturday in their defeat of Williams by the lopsided score of 11-0, every indication points to one of the closest games of the season here Friday

when the Gonzaga team from Spokane battles with Schieler's charges.

Gonzaga has an abundance of veteran material of a really high character and although the coach was changed this year, the system was not, as both Doran, the former mentor, and "Cipper" Smith, are devotees of the Rockne style of play.

As if to add interest, Schieler and Smith will both use somewhat the same plan of attack in all probability. Smith was one of Rockne's assistants in the coaching school the famous mentor held here last summer, in which Schieler, of course, also played an important

part. Both will use the backfield shift and both the veering ends.

The Aggies will probably outweigh the visitors on the line in spite of the fact that Jim Dixon, giant tackle, will be out of the lineup with a leg injury. The Bulls, however, have not used line smashes to any extent this season anyway, hence their offensive weapons—end sweeps and passes—will not be seriously affected by the Aggie's strong line.

In spite of the fact conference company in which they have been traveling for several years, Gonzaga has emerged undefeated in the last two seasons. Even Idaho's strong team last year could not wrest a victory from the fighting Irish. This year her flashy backfield dealt by the wit Ingram is strong in both ability and experience, presenting a real threat to the coast conference teams to be met.

The game will count in Northwest conference standings but not in the coast race. Coming as it does on Friday, the game here will be seen by many fans who will go to Eugene for the Idaho-Oregon game the next day. No reserve seats will be sold here Friday, as nearly 20,000 seats are under cover.
