FIRE HAZARDS REMOVED
PENDLETON, Ore.—The city of Pendleton now has fewer fire hazards in the form of old wooden buildings than ever before, according to a statement made by W. E. Ringold, fire chief.

During the past year or so, four highly hazardous frame buildings have been razed. On three of the sites fireproof buildings have been

constructed. The old hazards removed included the wooden buildings on Alta street owned by the Knights of Pythias, the old Palling building at Water and Main streets, the old residence on the Temple lot at the corner of Water and Cottonwood streets, and the Sloan building at the corner of Alta and Cottonwood streets.
